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Bike riders finally get purpose built carriages

MOUNTAIN bikers and other cyclists now have easier access to popular offroad trails and other riding areas in and around the southern suburbs, with bikefriendly rail carriages operating on the Belair line from last month.

Five rail carriages are being reconfigured to allow more space for bicycles.

The bike-friendly service will be available during weekends, public holidays and off-peak services. Trains on the Belair line will include an existing standard carriage and a reconfigured, bike service carriage.

The refitted carriages only require a two-seat reduction to the standard 72-seat configuration while providing additional bike storage space.

MP for Waite, Catherine Hutchesson was happy to see the initiative come into action.

"One of our election commitments was to do a review and investigate rail car modifications which may be able to be used for bicycle carriages on weekends, public holidays and school holidays," said Catherine.

"I am passionate about encouraging public transport use and this carriage will enable all of our community to travel in comfort.

"I know MTB riders and other cyclists

will find it much easier to use the service and enjoy all the trails Mitcham Hills has to offer!

"I'm really excited about being able to deliver on this," said Catherine. "The bike carriage for the Belair train is one that's been raised with me quite a number of times, by both the commuters who just like to sit on the train in peace, but then also the people who like to use their bikes, and being able to get on and off quickly.

"It's not only going to be great for our mountain biking community, but it means people can ride to work every day and get on the train carriage and come home, and also families can bring up a whole group of people on the train," explained Catherine.

However, not all in the community are convinced the solution will solve issues of shared usage of train carriages.

Local resident Mr Chris Stagg, who brought the issue to our attention following an experience resulting in negative consequences of having to share carriage space with an excessive number of bikes blocking exit routes, said the response from those he had spoken to, has been mixed

"Having spoken to a number of the boys on one of the "Bike Friendly Carriages" recently on the journey from Mitcham to Blackwood, I tend to agree with one of the lads who said "... at least they are trying to do something ..."

"Other comments were less flattering about the carriage layout. One lad showed me a picture of what he and other boys were expecting the bike carriage interior to look like (see photo on lower left) - taken from the interior of a German train in response to solving a similar issue with bikes on trains, and I must admit I had the same expectations.

"On the issue of encouraging regular passengers to embrace train travel, I believe the current situation will at least help to alleviate commuters issues of safety," added Chris.

"Again, having spoken to others, this is largely dependant on bikes being restricted only to the bike specific carriage, which I understand is not the case, and security personnel being aboard each train travelling between Mitcham and Belair."

The same carriages will operate during peak times on weekdays, however cyclists using the carriage at these times (before 9am and between 3-6pm) must have a ticket both for themselves and a separate, additional peak concession ticket for their bicycle.

Travellers should always consider the safety and comfort of other passengers, and cyclists are required to remain with their bikes on-board the bike carriage.

Our local businesses also were helping. Premium Fitness, Anytime Fitness and the Blackwood Rec Centre all offering their showers and bathrooms to those without power.


Café 1923 offering free coffees to all first responders and local offices offering use of electricity to charge phones and laptops, along with a warm cup of tea.

COUNCIL elections wrapped up last month, seeing Heather Holmes-Ross returning to serve as Mitcham Mayor for a second term.

With the retirement of former Craigburn Ward councillor Lindy Taueber, the ward, which now hosts 2 elected members, down from the previous 3 due to a redistribution of boundaries, will see returning councillors Karen Hockley and Darren Kruse retain their positions.

Corin McCarthy also returns to represent Park Ward, with newly elected member Tom Morrison filling the position vacated by Cr Jane Bange, who was also successful in her campaign to represent Overton Ward down on the plains.

Heather was grateful to residents for their ongoing support. "I thank the community for putting their faith in me to serve for a second term," she said.

"I'm really excited about the new council. We have an absolutely terrific group of elected members. There are 5 new faces and 7 previous members.

"It is a wonderfully diverse representative group. All the elected members are really keen to serve the community to the best of their ability and I am proud to lead this council. I

have great expectations that we will be able to achieve fantastic outcomes.

"I'm very aware of the current economic climate, and that it is particularly incumbent on council to provide the best value for money services we can," Heather added.

Though new to Mitcham Council, Tom Morrison has been involved in the community for some time through his work with Blackwood Action Group, and involvement with 20 Metre Trees, which raises awareness of the importance of trees in our urban environment. His work on tree preservation having garnered him the title of City of Mitcham's Young Citizen of the Year 2021.

Tom noted that this term of council would be crucial for the future of the unique character of the area.

"The next four years we are going to start seeing the impacts that the State Planning and Design Code have upon the local area," Tom said.

"It's really important that we try to get it put together in a system that will work for the future, because the precedents are being set now, and we need to make sure that what is put in place, will serve us in the long term."

Heather also wished to praise the level of engagement from

voters across Mitcham Council, with 40.35% of residents in Park ward returning their ballots, along with 38% of residents in Craigburn ward, both well above the state average of 33.91%.

While Mitcham as a whole saw 34.88% of residents cast their vote.

"I'd like to congratulate our residents on their spectacularly high voting rate," said Heather. "The hills residents in particular were some of the highest in Metropolitan Adelaide, and the council as a whole was the 3rd highest percentage of respondents across Metropolitan councils."

Tom was also very grateful for the outstanding engagement seen amongst the community. "We had higher turnout than 4 years ago when there were 7 candidates running, so it's a real testament to just how engaged the local area is.

"People really care about where they live up here and they are genuinely interested in being engaged and being involved in local government.

"There are also people who may not have a good idea of how local government works, but there was a great deal of response from my door-knocking that people want to become more educated on how they can be involved and know more about it. It's great that there is that desire," added Tom.

THE Blackwood Station Directional sign was originally erected in 1938 on the corner of Station Road and Main Road Blackwood at the roundabout, known then as 'Fiveways'.

During the Depression years, numerous station signs were produced to maintain employment at the Islington workshops with the Blackwood sign the only one installed in the Mitcham Hills.

The sign, with an arrow, was printed in large letters 'TO BLACKWOOD RAILWAY STATION' with rail timetables attached.

In 2010, Rail Headquarters management



Depot open extra 'free' week to help residents clear debris



FOLLOWING on from last month's cyclonic storm and subsequent devastation across the Hills, the City of Mitcham will open its Lynton Green Waste Depot for an extra week and has scheduled a second green bin collection day for hills suburbs to help residents clear storm debris from their properties

The Lynton Green Waste Depot will be open as follows ... free green waste dates in November are:

Wednesday 23 November 9am to 3pm Thursday 24 November 9am to 3pm Friday 25 November 9am to 3pm Saturday 26 November 9am to 3pm Sunday Closed

Monday 28 November 9am to 3pm Tuesday 29 November 9am to 3pm Wednesday 30 November 9am to 3pm

As well, Mitcham Council are providing an extra green bin collection day for residents to help clear storm debris in Belair, Hawthorndene, Upper Sturt, Glenalta, Eden Hills, Bellevue Heights, Craigburn Farm, Blackwood and Coromandel Valley is scheduled for Saturday 26 November. And with the start of the bushfire season, the City of Mitcham are advising that residents must 'Prepare to Act and Survive' to avoid making last-minute decisions that could prove deadly during a bushfire.

Thinking 'I will leave early' is not enough.

Bushfire prevention is a year-round responsibility and necessity. It is far more than a weekend clean-up just prior to the bushfire season.

The City of Mitcham website can help you to take actions to minimise the risk to you, your family and your property in the event of a bushfire.

Most importantly, it will help you to plan for a bushfire. Making an informed decision well in advance of a bushfire as to whether you should stay in your house or go is perhaps the most important decision you and your family can make to protect yourselves.

So if have a large amount of garden waste and need somewhere to dispose of it? The City of Mitcham has several options for residents looking to put their garden waste to good use.

- * Recycle garden waste using your green organics bin (don't forget you can also include your food scraps)
- * Set up a compost bin or worm farm
- * Take your garden waste to the Lynton Green Organics Drop-off Facility which is located on Beagle Terrace in Lynton.

This service is available for City of Mitcham residents who maintain their own properties.

You'll be charged a fee for disposal, except on the free days indicated below:

December 3 & 12; January 21 and February 18.

The garden organic waste collected is transported to a commercial composting contractor and turned into mulch.

On average, the depot receives over 600 tonnes of garden organics each year. This is a remarkable achievement for City of Mitcham residents.





Concerns over upgrade to Belair Triangle roads

DRIVING along Main Road towards Belair, you may have noticed construction works have commenced around the "Belair Triangle" intersection, honouring a Federal funding commitment to upgrade the Mitcham Hills Road Network.

The works have drawn some confusion from the community, with a lack of design updates being provided prior to work commencement.

In February 2021, the Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) released the proposed concept designs for this project, along with the Old Belair Road and James Road junction.

The designs were developed in response to feedback received from the community during the early 2020 planning study phase of consul-

The Main Road and Russell Street, Main Road/Belair Road and Sheoak Road, and Sheoak Road and Russell Street junctions design remains primarily as presented during the consultation period due to the site limitations. Opportunities to minimise vegetation and land impacts continue to be investigated.

Local resident, Greg O'Grady, spokesperson for 'Friends of Old Belair Road' states that a lack of transparency has marked the project.

"The team at DIT is incredibly aware that we are ready and willing to engage," said Greg, "and despite promises from the Minister that we would be involved we've heard absolutely

"There has been zero detail released on this project since the first concept design was released years ago.



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"Sadly, DIT is delivering more of the same by failing to provide updated information in regards to what's going on. But at some stage, we can expect to see increased road widths and then ultimately, a set of traffic lights controlling this intersection.

"But as of September 1, when the Friends of Old Belair Road met with DIT CEO Jon Whelan (senior advisor to the Minister Evan Knapp), and freshly appointed DIT Project Director Michael Rander, we heard that the design was complete and all was ready to go! Quite a surprise," explained Greg.

Greg has called for the release of a Infrastructure South Australia independent review on the James Road/Old Belair Road intersection, noting the importance of traffic flow modelling to give an overview of how the network will be improved by the upgrades.

His criticisms paint a picture of the designs not taking into account real world community concerns and traffic impact, voicing particular concern for pedestrian and cyclist movement in the area.

"There has been inadequate attention given to the walking/cycling movements of the ever increasing number of pre-school and school age kids that are moving into the area," said Greg.

"Traffic in the area is substantially reduced during times of school or public holidays, and yet, what has been done to help allow our kids to safely walk and ride to school ... when those journeys are only a matter of minutes down the road? Where's the local school bus loop?

"In the absence of this having any proper consideration, what we see is parents adding to morning and afternoon peak hour congestion through shuttling their kids on this journey by

"So, what's else is coming? - well... we don't really know for sure. The concept design image on the DIT website is 18 months old (dated May 2021) and still with the Liberal Government "Building What Matters" branding.

"It would be nice to see the final design drawings but alas, the general public only gets to see vague and outdated "Artist Impression Only" pictures," added Greg.

Fulton Hogan are performing buried services works to re-locate communications cabling in the area, given that the current location of the cable termination pits will be consumed by the expanded width of Main Road as part of the changes to this intersection.

"The bikes are free, however, if you can make a small donation to the church which in turn goes towards purchasing more spare parts to repair the bikes, it would be appreciated," explained Peter.

The Community Bike Shed is located behind the Blackwood Uniting Church near the roundabout, and is open each Monday from 9.30am to 12noon.

So come along any Monday morning if you could use a good quality reconditioned bike as a Christmas present for someone; or to drop off a bike that you are no longer using that could go to a good home.

It's a great community project that prevents many bikes ending up as landfill.

Beware the button batteries

Keep a look out for button batteries lurking in:

WHEN buying Christmas presents and toys for children this year, make sure you check to see if any batteries are required - especially button batteries.

In Australia, one child a month is seriously injured after swallowing or inserting a button battery, with some of them sustaining lifelong injuries.

Button batteries pose a severe injury risk, particularly in children aged 0 to 5 years. Young children are at the greatest risk due to their narrower oesophagus and tendency to place small objects into their mouths, ears and noses.

Many children's toys are powered by or use button batteries to produce light and sound

effects, including plush toys, toy cars, digital pets, early learning watches, light-up yo-yos, games, novelty items and singing Santas etc.

If swallowed, a button battery can become stuck in a child's throat and result in catastrophic injuries and even death. Insertion of button batteries into body orifices such as ears and noses can also lead to significant injuries. Keep

new and used button batteries out of sight and out of reach of children at all times.

Button batteries are also used in a broad range of consumer and household products including remote controls, watches, computers, cameras, calculators, torches, flameless candles, fitness devices, digital kitchen and bathroom scales, musical greeting cards, and home

The safety risk to children from button batteries arises when they can get access to the batteries. Children can access button batteries in a variety of ways, including:

- products with battery compartments that are not secure
- · button battery packaging that is not child resistant
- poor quality products which release button batteries when dropped or broken
- spare batteries being provided loose in product packaging
- spare batteries not being kept out of reach around the home
- used batteries not being properly disposed of.

If swallowed, coinsized button batteries can lodge in a child's oesophagus.

An electrical current is immediately triggered by saliva, which causes a chemical reaction that can cause severe burns to the child's oesophagus and internal organs. Serious injury can occur in as little as two hours and the results can be fatal.

Once burning begins, damage can continue even after the battery is removed from the body. Repairing the damage can be painful and may require multiple surgeries over many years. This can result in ongoing treatment and plans for injuries sustained from button battery ingestion. ☐ For more information and advice, visit www. productsafety.gov.au/products/electronics-technology/button-batteries








Packing boxes for Christmas gives residents bigger purpose

RETIREMENT living residents at Resthaven Bellevue Heights, have undertaken their annual 'Operation Christmas Child' project, packing boxes full of goodies to distribute to underprivileged children this Christmas.

The project, part of international organisation, 'Samaritan's Purse,' began at the site in 2013. Over the years, Resthaven's contribution has totalled an amazing 1,036 boxes for vulnerable children across the world.

Resident, Mrs Nadine Olafsen, said, "Our group started collecting and knitting items in April, so that we can fill as many boxes as possible, when it comes to packing day in October."

The boxes are packed and filled in the retirement living resident communal area, Gum Tree Lodge, which provides plenty of space for the mounds of boxes – which is lucky, as, "This year, we had the goal of filling 50 boxes, and we managed to fill 60!

"It is a great initiative that we all look forward to each year," says Mrs Olafsen. "It is truly heart-warming and gives us all a bigger purpose."

Now that 'Operation Christmas Child' is complete, renovations can start on Gum Tree Lodge, part of stage two of a \$27m transformation taking place across the entire Resthaven Bellevue Heights complex (see advert below).

The first stage of the two-year major redevelopment on site was completed in October, and includes a new, modern extension to the residential aged care home, with amazing views overlooking Sturt Gorge.

Manager Residential Services, Leanne Spencer, said, "Stage 2 commenced in November, and involves demolition of the older areas, and construction of 23 new rooms, including a new service area comprising kitchen, laundry and staff areas.

"Temporary facilities for these have been built, to ensure there are no interruptions in service provision.

"A big change is the temporary relocation of reception, and a new site entrance throughout stage two.

"Our new circular driveway is complete, with the new roadway system one way traffic flow only. Signage is in place to avoid confusion.

"The entire redevelopment project is scheduled to be complete in August 2023. We look forward to seeing the end result!" added I eanne.

"THE support from businesses in Blackwood to host a 'little orange lady' and use orange as a theme in their shops has been incredible this year," said Bev Hocking, spokesperson from the Zonta Club of Adelaide Hills.

Each year, from 25 November the 'International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women', to 10 December 'World Human Rights Day'; the 16 days of activism campaign calls for action against one of the world's most persistent violations of human rights – violence against women.

ing more aware of the destructive capacity of storms. While I recall a tornado in the Barossa in about 1981, I don't recall the destructive storms we have been seeing in recent years from my childhood.

State Member for Waite Catherine Hutchesson, newly re-elected Mayor Heather Holmes-Ross and I showed Federal Emergency Services Minister Murray Watt around on Wednesday 16th November, four days after the latest storm hit Adelaide (and a fair swathe of the state right up to the Northern Territory border and beyond).

At that stage tens of thousands of homes across Adelaide including many in Boothby were still without power. The piles of debris, the huge trees and branches that had been felled by the storm, and the smashed cars and homes were a truly sobering sight. Residents described the winds as cyclonic.

The federal funding to help reduce fuel load ahead of the bushfire season will no

doubt be very welcome, as will the commitment of two Quick Response Vehicles to the Sturt CFS Group.

Credit and thanks must go to those volunteers who braved the storm to help those of us in need - the South Australian Country Fire and State Emergency Services, who between them had over 1350 call-outs in the Boothby area.

Staff of Metropolitan Fire Service, SA Police, local councils and of course SA Power Networks have also been working night and day to clean up the mess, restore power and make the roads safe again. The work to make street trees, parks and reserves safe will likely take much longer.

Tennis courts remain open to public

A NEW storyboard has been created on the site of the former Gibbs Park Tennis Club to celebrate the history of community building in Eden Hills.

The storyboard was gifted by the Wonoka Street club, which was forced to close last year after more than 100 years due to falling membership. However, the tennis courts remain open for the public to utilise.

Mitcham Mayor Dr Heather Holmes-Ross unveiled the large 2.2m by 1.2m history sign which has been designed in keeping with similar storyboards produced by Blackwood Action Group (BAG) in the Mitcham Council area.

Gibbs Park Tennis Club was named after two of its founding members, William Arthur Gibbs and his wife Elizabeth, and some of their descendants attended the ceremony. They included Margaret Wicks who provided many of the historical photos for the storyboard.

The club's former president, Ian Williams, said Gibbs Park had a long and rich history stretching back to the First World War.

"The land was donated to the community in 1914 by local property owners and prominent Quakers, Edwin Ashby and his cousin Ernest Saunders. Residents took full advantage of the gift," he said.

The storyboard helps celebrate that history and provides a snapshot of the community building shown by people when they settled in the area.

"It's sad we were unable to keep the club going, because it held an important place in the development of Eden Hills," said Ian.

"But we're delighted that Mitcham Council has given an assurance to maintain the land as a recreational reserve, and the tennis courts are now open for anyone to use."

Ian said the club would have closed much sooner if it wasn't for the efforts of former committee members, particularly Theo and Roelien Pistorius.

He also thanked Councillor Lindy Taeuber, a member of Blackwood Action Group's history team, who helped provide historical information for the storyboard.

Consequences of storm reminds us of impact of climate change

THE recent storm that cut a destructive swathe through the Blackwood district was a wake-up call on several fronts.

- It made us aware of the things we rely on for our daily lives; supermarkets being open with shelves and fridges full of produce for us to select from, electricity for heating, cooling, cooking, hot water and keeping our phones charged all the time.
- It tested our capacity to live without power for several days. We made good use of the barbecue for cooking meals and hot drinks. Our emergency supply of candles and torches was well used.

We managed to get some ice to keep food cold in the esky, but sadly some things from the fridge and freezer had to be thrown out. We have back-up chargers for our phones which enabled them to stay charged for the duration of the blackout.

 We have been warned for decades about the implications of a changing climate, which we have been mostly ignoring or dismissing until recently.

Bushfires, droughts and floods; and now our turn to experience an extreme storm event must surely make us appreciate the impacts of a changing climate.

The recent United Nations COP27 climate summit warned that our warming climate has seen the number of climate related disasters double over the last few decades.

"Countries have a choice of seriously cutting emissions quickly or condemning future generations to climate catastrophe," warned the UN Secretary General.

Australia remains the big-

gest per capita emitter of greenhouse gasses in the developed world, and the largest exporter of emissions in the form of coal and gas.

So what can we do to make a difference?

We need to be better prepared for the extreme weather events that are going to happen – things like:

- Becoming more self-reliant for times without power. (We are now looking carefully at the quantity of things we need to keep in the fridge).
- Reducing our dependence on electricity for everything. (Making our house cope with temperature variations without needing air conditioning).
- Living a simpler lifestyle (more about that next month).

We can also do things like:

- Become better informed about the science of climate change.
- Tell our politicians that we are concerned about our future, and to take more serious cli-

mate actions.










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
