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


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One door closes another market opens

MANY people will be disappointed to hear that the craft market held on the first Sunday of every month for the past 25 years, has closed!

But wait ... a new market is starting up in the same venue on the same day, with the first one opening on Sunday, February 4.

"We've been attending the Blackwood markets for the past 2 years, fundraising for our daughter's Autism Assistance Dog, by selling the items she makes through her micro business Mirrored Hearts - Blackwood," said Kylie Willmer, co-organizer with her daughter, Yasmin, of the new Sunshine Heart Market.

"When we heard that the market was closing, we had no hesitation in taking over and bringing our own flavour to the popular monthly event.

'We would like to be able to support local small businesses and hobbyists with a local market, while also providing opportunities for local groups to fundraise, local youth to be supported in their entrepreneurial endeavours, connecting with local schools for their music students to be able to busk etc. The options are endless, and we are excited to get to know the community more," added Kylie.

The Sunshine Heart Market opens on Sunday February 4 from 10am - 3pm; and is held in the same location ... Blackwood Memorial Hall, 21 Coromandel Parade, Blackwood.

They will also be running a Mirrored Hearts market stall, as well as Young Hearts Pop Up Market, a market for young entrepreneurs aged 5 to 18 years.

They plan to make space for a community BBQ, for local community groups, sporting groups, and schools etc at no charge. They just need to supply a BBQ and all the food to go with it, and they can fundraise for their own group.

While one free stall a month will go to a local charity/non for profit for fundraising pur-

Also there will be two half price stalls each month for Young Entrepreneurs starting out aged 5 to 25 years.

"Unfortunately, over my time, the funding for the Botanic Garden has been repeatably pruned. The Garden staff do a remarkable job, considering limited financial resources, always thinking of new ways to improve the collections and visitor experiences.

"I believe Wittunga is a unique Botanic Garden, in fact, the only one I know of that focuses on plants from just two continents/ countries; Southern Australia and South Africa. All the plants are what are called "water wise" and most suitable for our weather.

"We would love to hear from you, even if you are just mildly interested, and we can give you a run down on how you may be able to help," explained Helena.

Local resident and Wittunga Hands on Hort volunteer, Robyn Priest, moved to Blackwood

from the North Coast of NSW and wanted to meet new people.

"My Mother was in care at Bellevue Heights and loved going to Wittunga. Volunteering is a way of expressing thanks for the beauty of the Garden. As the number of paid staff has shrunk, it is also a way of encouragement to them. It is a wonderful way to spend a couple of hours with like minded people," added Robyn.

While another local resident and Hands on Hort volunteer, Roger Henderson said, "I enjoy the opportunity to work in such a special environment. Regular time with like minded people is special to me, and doing a little to help a special community resource is important to me".

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Demand for housing vs loss of amenity

CLAIMS that Mitcham Council has failed to update its development plan to accommodate growing demand in the housing market, have renewed debates around the need to balance increased housing availability, with the preservation of the character which makes areas such as Mitcham desirable.

In an interview with 'the Advertiser' last month, Master Builders Association SA chief executive Will Frogley, claimed there were a large number of blocks of sizes between 700-1,000sqm unable to be subdivided within the City of Mitcham, suggesting there was room for over 1,000 additional houses to be constructed within the council area, and referring to their development plans as "outdated."

While this assessment is reflective of a desire to meet increased housing demand, Craig Harrison, Mitcham Council General Manager for Development and Community Safety, says claims that Council has failed to substantially update its development plan overlook their careful strategic planning over a number of years.

"The City of Mitcham updated its Development Plan in 2020 bringing citywide change through creating opportunities for investment and growth. This project commenced in 2017 to identify suitable areas for housing and employment growth," Mr Harrison said.

This policy work started with a review of the entire council area, with Council endorsing a Spatial Vision and Structure Plans for key growth precincts in 2019. The City of Mitcham Growth Areas Development Plan Amendment was approved by the Minister for Planning in August 2020.

Mr Harrison noted that the council's planning had identified a number of areas for smaller blocks in the City of Mitcham. "A key outcome of the Growth Areas Development Plan was the reduction of minimum housing allotment sizes

in a number of key growth areas to as low as $250m^2$," he said.

He noted that the work carried out by the City of Mitcham on growth was highlighted and commended by the Minister for Planning.

Mr Harrison said that the council had tried to weigh up various needs of their ratepayers in their strategic planning.

"It is important that the growth in residential development to meet the needs of South Australia, should be delivered across all council areas, in a planned and considered manner, taking account of the varied needs, constraints, opportunities and balance between

the natural and built environments," he said.

Council's Development Plans were superseded by the State Planning and Design Code in 2021. The new planning system also allows for privately funded and run Planning Code Amendments to be undertaken.

Mr Harrison noted that council continues to be actively engaged with its community, adjoining Councils and the State Government on further opportunities for growth, including those associated with the Torrens to Darlington (South Road) project.

"There are several State Government policy projects currently underway, which will have potential implications on growth in certain areas, relating to reviews of tree, flooding and bushfire policy," he said.

"The City of Mitcham continues to work closely with the State Government on all planning reform, including on the recently released Greater Adelaide regional plan discussion paper which will help to guide and inform residential housing growth across the region.

"Our submission on the Greater Adelaide

regional plan emphasised the importance of our spatial vision."

However, local Blackwood resident Andrew Tidswell, said that while increasing our suburban density is important to responsibly house increasing numbers of people within the existing metropolitan area, the ad-hoc and unplanned carving up of properties to build multiple units that the housing industry loves, is the wrong way to do it.

"The housing industry's only real aim is to stay in business, which means maximising return on investment," he said. "They have no serious interest in sensitive development; nor should we expect them to have. It is the job of State and Local Governments to ensure that the interests of the public and communities are met by the rules and regulations they put in place to manage increasing suburban density in ways that benefit existing and future residents of those areas."

Mr Tidswell was critical of the current State Planning guidelines in reaching this outcome.

"The current State Planning Code is merely a tick-box checklist that does nothing to encour-

age good outcomes; it has no real commitment to good planning," he said. "Local government is the last bastion of protecting desirable existing environments."

Mr Tidswell said there were examples of more sensitive high density development around Adelaide, most recently Bowden and Football Park.

"Even in Blackwood, in the past, there have been small-scale developments that provided multiple houses and units in landscaped surroundings giving increased density with desirable environments," he said.

While MBA's Mr Frogley complains about "NIMBYs" blocking development opportunities, Mr Tidswell said we shouldn't be surprised that most people object to the way the industry messes up our suburbs.

"What we need is good planning by the authorities, and rules that require sensitive development by the industry, that actually improves the amenity and liveability of our suburban environments," he added.


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LoTs of things to borrow for free

IMAGINE being able to borrow from a library of tools and items, instead of having your shed or kitchen filled with seldom-used gadgets.

Or, perhaps you're keen to try baking, but have never owned a muffin tray. What if you could borrow one from a 'Library of Things' to see if you enjoy using it?

"A proposed Blackwood Library of Things is starting to become a reality," said Ian Naismith, a Blackwood resident who is the main driving force behind this local project.



The Library of Things (LoT) allows you to try new equipment, get one-time tasks done, or practise new skills before deciding to invest in more household items. You'll save money, save space, and reduce waste.

It promotes community sharing, trying new things, avoiding clutter at home, and reducing the amount of packaging waste in your bin.

A meeting to discuss the future of a proposed Library of Things (known as a LoT) in Blackwood, was held in early January and well supported by several very keen followers, who pledged to help bring the concept to fruition.

At the meeting, Ian explained the concept of the planned Blackwood Library of Things to the group, including how they operate and the pitfalls and benefits to the community.

It was agreed to form a steering committee and move forward with the process of establishing for a trial period in a small outlet in Blackwood.

"The owner of the Ready4SUCCESS business which operates out of shop 2, 10 Waite Street in Blackwood, next door to Blackwood Pets, has generously offered some space after reorganising her business and reading about the search for premises by the organisers,"



It was proposed at the meeting that the Blackwood LoT initially open on the weekends as a trial. This will provide the community with an opportunity to discover the benefits of borrowing rather than buying many items.

A call will be put out to locals to consider donating suitable items for the LoT and consider volunteering their time and expertise with establishing the venture.

A survey seeking what people would want to borrow from the LoT will also be posted on the Blackwood 'Library of Things' Facebook page.

The next meeting to discuss topics will be held on Tuesday, February 6 at 7pm in shop 2, 10 Waite Street, Blackwood, and anyone interested is welcome to attend.

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Exploring historical fauna stories of the district



This year, the Blackwood Action Group History articles will be themed around the fauna of the district as we explore historical stories of native species, conservation, feral animals and other curious animal tales.



'From Fun to Feral'

RED foxes (Vulpes vulpes) were imported into Australia early in the 19th century to replicate the fox hunting experience so beloved of the formerly English settlers.

Two contemporary works featuring the hunt are by local Adelaide artist ST Gill, a watercolour, *The Hunt Meets at Dry Creek Near Adelaide* (1845), and a larger watercolour, *Winter* (1840-42).

In the latter, a hunter clad in a blazing red coat and riding boots with tan tops waves a riding hat and fox's brush. The hounds are proper English foxhounds. By 1842, a pack of such hounds had been established in Adelaide, and the Adelaide Hunt Club held its winter meets in the traditional style, with uniforms and champagne. (Grishin 2015)

Enthusiasm for hunting is summarised in the words of Thomas Chirnside, an early importer of foxes in western Victoria, who commented 'a man could not be thoroughly healthy unless he rode fast and straight to hounds'. (Evening journal 25/6/1887)


By the beginning of the new century however, it had become apparent that foxes, far from being the hunted for recreation, had become a serious threat to the agricultural industry upon which the state depended, including the Blackwood district.

'The fox that caused such havoc in Mr Treloar's poultry yard is still going strong. On Tuesday night, he burrowed under the wire netting around Mr Mansel's poultry yard and killed a dozen of his most promising Easter ducks and a couple of fowls.' (Observer 15/4/1911)

'Mr C found a litter of 6 young foxes in a burrow near the

viaduct on Sunday. The hole included the skeletons of 4-5 fowls and the remains of rabbits, bandicoots and rats.' (Daily Herald 29/10/1912)

'11 chickens were taken from Kalyra Home by foxes and several residents of the district have lost poultry.' (Daily Herald 29/10/1912)

The fox problem continued in the agricultural district throughout the 20th century.

'Foxes are becoming troublesome owing to the scarcity of rabbits and are attacking lambs and poultry. Mr Norris of Hawthorndene had a large number of his best laying hens killed during his brief absence from home,' (Advertiser 19/7/38)

'Over the last month, three house holders suffered loss of poultry in the Eden Hills district with approximately 60 fowls killed. It is believed that the fowls were killed either by ferrets, foxes or dogs. The fowls were housed in a pen with a high wire fence and found with their necks punctured. Blackwood police are investigating.' (Coromandel 19/4/64)

The PIRSA (Primary Industries and Regions South Australia) website states 'The European fox is an agricultural, environmental and social pest. They have been implicated in the decline and extinction of many small and medium sized rodents and marsupials in Australia. Foxes pose a threat to livestock by preying on poultry, lambs and kids'.

Fox hunting in the 21st century has a more sinister meaning than originally thought, with baiting and bounty offering two ways of attempting to control the fox population, estimated to be over seven million in Australia.



Alpacas, used for many years by shepherds in the Andes, have been used locally to protect lambs and poultry. These are generally peaceful animals, however, when on guard duty, rise on their back legs and bring the full weight of their bodies down on marauders such as foxes.

Foxes still plague poultry owners in the Blackwood district. At many social gatherings conversation turns to sightings of foxes crossing roads in daylight and, inevitably, to sad tales of favourite hens taken by foxes.

Fruit sharing program growing

A BLACKWOOD resident is using community grant funding from Mitcham and Onkaparinga Councils to reduce fruit wastage in the area.

Brett Dunstone, who has called Blackwood his home since 2010, saw the opportunity to make use of the fertile backyard harvests in the community for a good cause, after becoming aware of a group in Ballarat pioneering a similar initiative.

"The group, named The Hidden Orchard, harvests fruit from trees in people's yards in the community, getting volunteers to come in and help pick when people may not be able to themselves, and share the fruit between the owner of the tree, the volunteers, and food charities in the community," he said of the inspiration behind the concept.

After posting to Facebook to assess interest, Brett teamed up with Onkaparinga Food Security Collaborative to get a grant from Onkaparinga Council.

While the Onkaparinga group are working in collaboration as an extended distribution network, Brett undertook the initial trial in the Mitcham area himself. Following another successful grant application to Mitcham Council, the project has continued to grow.

"We are still figuring out how exactly we will operate, but we have already done a few harvests, and have started becoming more organised as more interest and volunteers come onboard; it seems to be an idea that resonates with a lot of people," he said.

"The main thing that we're struggling with at the moment is getting fruit trees registered. We've got a good number of volunteers, with over 20 in the Mitcham Council area alone, but we could also do with more."

Brett hopes that with enough interest, the Fruit Share group may be able to offer additional assistance such as pruning and tree maintenance to those unable to tend to their own gardens.

Fruit donations will be going to Fred's Van (Vinnies, Hawthorn), The Hut (Aldgate) and any other local food charities that turn up.

"We really would like any charities in need of fruit to get involved as well," Brett said. "We want to be able to spread the concept as widely as possible. It's nice to know where your food comes from, and particularly coming relatively locally.

"It may not always be perfect, but it's such a surprise to see what you find in people's backyards," said Brett.

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Saturday sausage sizzles help raise funds for local causes

WHEN shopping in the Drakes Centre on some Saturday mornings, you may have noticed a sausage sizzle being held, or even been tempted to purchase one of their snag sandwiches.

They are organised by the Rotary Club of Coromandel Valley, which supports local causes with the funds raised at these popular sausage sizzles.

Funds are then donated to local charities and other local worthy causes. Recent beneficiaries have included the Country Fire Service, the Sturt SES, the Laurel Hospice, the Friends of the Blackwood Forest, the Coromandel Cricket Cub, the Blackwood Players and the Blackwood Action Group.

Occasionally funds raised by the sausage sizzles go further afield. A recent example of this was when the proceeds of two sausage sizzles were sent to a Rotary appeal for civilians in Ukraine shortly after the Russian invasion.

Notably, the sausage sizzles for Ukraine attracted the largest amount of donations.

The sausage sizzles held twice a

month, are supported by local businesses including Country Meat, Baker's Delight Blackwood and the Drakes Supermarket in Blackwood.

The sausage sizzles are manned by volunteer members of the Coro Rotary Club and, where practicable, members of the organisation for which the funds are being raised that week.

The sausage sizzles operate from 9am to 1pm, and are held on the Saturday following the first Monday of the month and the Saturday following the third Monday of the Month.

A cooked sausage in bread is sold for \$3, and there is no extra charge for cooked onion, or for sauce or mustard.

The idea of regular sausage sizzles was the brainchild of a former member of the Club, Keith Seanard. Previously, the club conducted sausage sizzles only four times a year, in conjunction with it's giant plant sales.

Move away from single-use culture

SOME years ago, we regularly used our reusable coffee cups when

purchasing a takeaway coffee, however, the 'pandemic' put a stop to their use for health reasons.

Mostly, we have coffee sitting in a café, but still take the reusable cups when we are likely to want a takeaway. We don't see other people using them any more. In fact often, there are people having coffee in a café using takeaway paper cups. Who would want to do that?

Planet Ark advises that 2.7 million paper cups are disposed of every day in Australia.

We are slowly getting better solutions to replace single use items containing plastic, with other more environmentally responsible alternatives now that governments are progressively banning single use plastic items.

These include compostable cups, bamboo cutlery and cardboard food containers. Apparently, we still don't have industries geared up to appropriately deal with the amount of compostable material we are already producing, let alone any increase in it. While these desirable alternatives demonstrate what is possible if industry is forced to act responsibly, it is not the ultimate solution. We really need to move away from the single-use throw-away culture for so many things.

Planet Ark also advises that we are gobbling up some 100 million tonnes of new materials from the earth each year; which is totally unsustainable.

Years ago, I remember going on picnics with a whole range of reusable items. We had sets of metal picnic cutlery, melamine plates, anodised cups and food in Tupperware containers. We probably had cloth serviettes. We produced very little waste. Sometime we changed to disposable items - containers, plates, cutlery and paper napkins.

Now, the largest single item at the end of a day out, is the garbag full of single use rubbish.

We eventually got used to reusable shopping bags despite some initial complaints. Now, these are an integral part of our shopping culture.

So it could be with other things.

And another thing, wouldn't it be great if some enterprising person could set up a business in Blackwood collecting coffee grounds from the large number of cafes; composting them into valuable organic fertiliser for households and the agriculture sector. Similar businesses exist in other suburbs.

I know that some cafes do this for their own business, but I suspect many still dispose of them in the landfill bin. $\hfill \Box$

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


World day of prayer to listen to other cultures' concerns



Bus Shelters and Council's Asset Management Plans

The January 2024 article "Student power results in new bus shelter near their school" was a great story about kids in our community creating positive change.

It's worth pointing out that Mitcham Council tracks the management of 159 bus shelters, but that's a mixture of Council's (87), the SA Government DPTI (36), and 32 Adshell's that earn advertising revenue for the SA Gov on main roads.

This new one near Hawthorndene Primary School will be another owned by DPTI. The balance are at Flinders Uni (2), and one each at Flinders Medical Centre and at the Edinburgh Hotel. Unfortunately, they are not marked with who owns each one.

Every year, Council builds new bus shelters (and new roads, kerbs, footpaths, car parks and bridges), according to need as part of our funded New Capital Works Program.

Of course, we also fund maintaining the condition of all our existing assets. We often hear from the community about the need for more footpaths in the hills, but seldom for new bus shelters. Unsurprising as Council maintains over 512km of footpaths and because over half of our roads in hills have no footpaths vs. \sim one third in the foothills and $\sim 15\%$ on the flats!

That said, I'm pleased that after several years of not funding any new footpaths, we voted last August to allocate \$882,000 for 16 new footpaths across the city. We build new footpaths where the staff identify need and as per priority.

Up the hill, this included Ashby Avenue and Keith Road. Progress will be made in delivering these footpaths during 2023/24 although construction completion will be unlikely for all within the 2023/24 year.

Every physical asset owned by Council (and it's condition on a scale of 1 to 5) is viewable online. Search for "Digital Asset Management Plans" on the Mitcham Council website on the page "Reports, management plans and guidelines".

These AMPs are due to be updated this year, so please have a look to see what Council is maintaining and building for our community and let us know what should be on the 2024/2025 budget as a priority.

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



Since then, I have been working with various stakeholders on opportunities for residents when these days occur. I am proud to share these initiatives which have so far been secured, and I assure you that I am continually exploring more opportunities for our community.

The generous family at Wallis Mitcham is offering \$10 movie tickets on Catastrophic Days, exclusively for Mitcham Hills residents. They are also opening their foyer and lounge as a cool refuge for anyone in need. So, next time the mercury soars, why not catch the latest movie in the cool comfort of the cinema? Just remember to bring along proof of residence, like a driver's license with your postcode.

After conversations with the SA Aquatic & Leisure Centre at Marion, they have generously provided \$20 family pool vouchers. These vouchers are available from my office and are an excellent addition to your Catastrophic Day plan. They are intended for use only on Catastrophic Days by residents in the Mitcham Hills within the Waite electorate.



For those of us with furry family members, the Tonsley Innovation Hub at 1284 South Road, Tonsley, is available to access on Catastrophic Days. They offer change rooms and food options from 9am-3pm (Monday -Friday). Kids can even bring their bikes or scooters.

The Blackwood Uniting Church (near the Blackwood roundabout), located within a Bushfire Safe Zone, opens its doors on Catastrophic Days. The church is fully airconditioned and pet-friendly. I encourage you to make your decisions early and have a plan for the day. If possible, it is better to be out of the district.

You can also opt to visit the Mitcham Memorial Library or the Aberfoyle Park Hub Library on these high-risk days.

I would like to thank all these venues for showing support to our area.

I am committed to building our community's resilience and will continue to work diligently to find more options for local residents.
