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# More waste going into green bins will save us money

A NUMBER of metropolitan councils such as Holdfast Bay, as well as West Torrens and Unley, are trialling a change of their general waste collection to a fortnightly service, while increasing the green waste collection.

However, Mitcham Council is adopting a 'wait and see' approach in monitoring the outcome of the trials by other councils.

Holdfast Bay Council, will start rolling out the change next month after an 18 month trial.

"We know that many of our residents are greatly concerned by climate change and this is this one of the easiest and most effective ways of reducing emissions," said Holdfast Bay Mayor, Amanda Wilson.

On their website, the council noted, 'local house-holds already put 80 per cent of recycling in the correct bin, but only 30 per cent of food scraps were going into the green bin.

'Therefore, a move to weekly organics, will have the biggest environmental benefit and create more jobs,' it added.

The City of Mitcham's Waste Management Strategy similarly states: "Sending waste to landfill is the least preferred option for manag-

ing waste. It is expensive and not sustainable.

"Diverting recoverable resources from the waste bin into the recycling or green organics bin at the household level, will reduce our reliance on landfill disposal, reduce our carbon footprint and provide financial savings for Council."

Mitcham Mayor, Dr Heather Holmes-Ross said, "we are legislated to have to pick up general waste once a week," said Heather.

"Holdfast's trial is an opt out, and we are very interested in the outcome, as we believe it is something our ratepayers will support and benefit from.

"If food scraps go in the green bin, it ultimately saves ratepayers money, because we pay a much higher gate charge sending things to landfill than we do sending organics to Jeffries," said Heather.

"By picking up green waste weekly, we hope that it could ultimately lead to a reduction of rates, with greater compliance to putting organic waste where it belongs. There is always a degree of contamination, but if you don't know, put it in the blue bin, because it costs a lot to deal with contamination."

Negligent bin use by South Australian households is creating \$20 million each

year in extra waste management costs, according to industry experts.

Incorrect use of general rubbish, recycling and green waste bins continues to present widespread problems, with councils across the state embarking on public education campaigns.

Contamination remains the biggest issue with yellow bins, while too much food waste is being put into red or blue bins which should be going into green bins.

While households in Mitcham are currently only supplied with General Waste and Recycling bins by council, this will change once the 2022/23 budget is passed.

"We recently moved that all residents will be able to have a kitchen caddy and compostable bags, and we will be providing green bins to residents," explained Heather.

"We hope that we can move towards collecting green bins weekly, as people will be more likely to put their compostables in their green bin, smell will be reduced and there is a large amount of food waste which goes into landfill currently which could easily be diverted to the green bin."

# Have your say on proposed cat laws

MITCHAM Council are seeking feedback from the community on some of their By-laws including: Permits and Penalties; Moveable Signs; Local Government Land; Roads; Dogs; Cats and Waste Management.

No major changes are proposed for: Permits and Penalties; Moveable Signs; Local Government Land; Roads; Dogs; and Waste Management By-laws; however, a significant change is proposed to By-law No.6 Cats which provides for the control and management of cats in the Council area and promote responsible cat ownership.

Three options are being presented to the community for feed-back on changes to the Cats By-law which is aimed to better protect wildlife from predatory behaviour, keep pets safe and help prevent cats from being a nuisance to neighbours and other residents.

\* Option 1:

By-Law includes provision now with the cat confinement clause to be phased in to be effective 1 January 2024. This provides a 12 month period after the commencement of the by-law to ensure that there is a comprehensive education and awareness campaign ahead of the provision commencing operation. It does not apply to cats registered before 1 January 2017, or to cats older than 6yrs as at 1 January 2023 (the 'grandfather provision') – this addresses the concerns previously raised about pet owners having to implement containment measures to control cats that have previously been able to freely wander.

\* Option 2:

The need for change in the future after further community engagement and further consideration of state-wide cat laws. This option provides the flexibility for Council to explore cat confinement further and ensures there is opportunity for further community engagement to consider the matter of cat confinement further and either resolve to implement cat confinement at a future date to be decided, or resolve not to implement this clause during the life of the by-law. It does not apply to cats registered before 1 January 2017, or to cats older than 6yrs as at 1 January 2023 (the 'grandfather provision') – this addresses the concerns previously raised about pet owners having to implement containment measures to control cats that have previously been able to freely wander.

\* Option 3

No changes to the existing by-law are proposed, Council will maintain a nuisance clause in the by-law whereby Council can address issues of nuisances created by cats, however it will not introduce cat confinement.

THE new Blackwood Community Hub building, which will house a new library and community centre in the heart of Blackwood, has been named 'Kumangka', a Kaurna term meaning 'to connect/coming together'.

Mitcham Council conducted community consultation on the naming of the Blackwood Community Hub and the Waite Street Reserve during March this year. The community consultation process that was undertaken for the naming, provided several naming suggestions which assisted in Council's final decision at their June 14 meeting.

However, Council is in the process of seeking approval from the Kaurna Yerta Aboriginal Corporation before the name is

While Mitcham Council was undertaking work on Waite Street Reserve, and engaging in onsite discussions related to cultural monitoring during the excavation phase, the Kaurna Elders and representatives from RAWsa\* that were present, were informed about the potential opportunity to name the Hub building with a Kaurna term.

These representatives immediately discussed their ideas and presented the term 'Kumangka' as they felt it represented all that the Hub was offering - a 'coming together' of people, ideas and opportunities.

"The library is a great resource, a place of sharing information. It's a great place to share Kaurna culture and our shared history," said a representative from Mitcham Council. "We stress the interconnectedness of heritage, culture, and identity."

The naming follows the formal start of the construction process, upon which a Smoking Ceremony was held at the site. Kaurna Elder Uncle Fred Agius (see photo) invited Elected Members, the project design team, tradesmen, the project control group and City of Mitcham staff to participate in the Ceremony, marking the official start of construction.

Schiavello Construction have been appointed as builders for

the two-storey Hub, which is centrally located in the heart of Blackwood, and will be a vibrant and inviting focal point for the local community, offering a public library, toilets, children's areas and toy library on the ground floor.

The second floor will include a community kitchen, outdoor seating area, gallery space, community meeting rooms, maker space and digital lounges.

"We are thrilled to be part of a project that will have a positive impact on the local community," said Dale Sweeney, SA Director and State Manager of Schiavello.

City of Mitcham Mayor, Dr Heather Holmes-Ross said the Ceremony and naming were a significant step in the project and reflected the Council's commitment to walking side by side with the Kaurna people.

"We recognise and celebrate the deep connection of the Kaurna people to the land," Heather said.

"Through our actions and our Reconciliation Action Plan, we hope to embed Aboriginal culture within the Council and the community at large."

Heather was happy to see a name which honours connection to place, and intentions of the project.

The Edwards Street carpark works are under way and due to be finished by mid to late August.

A water tank is to be installed beneath the Young Street car park in mid-July, to capture stormwater from the car park and slow down the flow to the surrounding reserve.

Onsite fencing has been put into place ahead of further construction works.

# Why choose the name 'BlackwoodTown'?

'BLACKWOODTOWN' is the name of this project. It's a name that encapsulates the idea we are working towards.

Blackwood ... Like most names, its meaning as a particular place or thing, is far greater than the actual words describing a colour of a tree or timber, even though the reference to nature is evocative of the hilltop location.

Blackwood is the place. So, if Blackwood is a place what does that mean? Most literally, it can be defined as: "a particular position, point, or area in space, a location, a locality".

But that's only the start of it, because the name triggers associations in your brain and these will be different for everyone. Images, memories, a sense of home, or a place to visit, a functional need like shopping, or where a friend

Or just a place to get through on your way somewhere else, and a difficult intersection.

This project is fundamentally about place. But it's about enriching place, maximising positive associations, creating new memories. Its about place that is dynamic, interesting, surprising, welcoming, nourishing and regenerative.

Blackwood is a place, but it would be hard to say any of those things about it right now.

While 'Town' implies a certain level of urbanity and a geographic scale.

Town is a human settlement on a scale bigger than a village and smaller than a city. A town can describe a central built-up area of busidefined boundary.

Town also emphasises a clear difference from the surrounding suburbia. The Adelaide Hills suburbia is a much loved, lower density settlement characterised by detached houses, larger lots and vegetation.

A town on the other hand, has permission to be built-up, with higher densities and mixed uses. A town's greater concentration then generates a greater energy, more social interactions, and more economic activity.

But the failure to have a clear boundary often means the worst of both types: a lower density suburban town centre and denser suburbia.

A real lose / lose result in the Hills. And pretty much describing the situation in Blackwood, where the centre really struggles to project its urbanity and spark any energy, while the backyards in the encircling suburbia are slowly being subdivided.

'BlackwoodTown' ... A single word to describe a place and an idea.

This Project sets out to envision a place where people will want to be, to live, work and play. A place with energy and a thriving local economy, a place on a hilltop, and that place is

Do you know where this is?

THANKS to the people who entered last month's hidden sites competition ... the winners' names will be posted on the BAG website. Information about the location and history of the site that was published in the June 2022 edition follows ...

'TOLL of Bathing Season Begins ... in Sturt River at Blackwood, there was a double tragedy, when Francis McLaren Collins (16), and Rodney Saint, the same age, lost their lives ... Collins, was accompanied by Saint and a boy named Rex Dunstan ... Arriving at Cave Hole (believed to be upstream of today's Sturt Gorge Dam Wall) which is considered to be the deepest portion of the river ... Saint stripped off and jumped into the water.

For about 10 minutes his two mates watched him splash and dive in the water, but in the next instant they were horrified to see him throw up his hands and then disappear ... Collins, with frantic haste, removed his boots and otherwise fully clothed dived into the river .... Though he could not swim, Collins made a desperate attempt to reach Saint, but young Dunstan, who also was unable to swim, was startled to see Collins go under. ... Realising that if the two boys were to be saved, help must be got immediately, he ran ...' for help. (The Mail 8 Oct. 1927).

Sadly, it was to no avail with the bodies of Frank and Rod, who were described as inseparable, being found.

Within weeks of the tragedy, the local community decided to erect a drinking fountain (see small pic above) in a central position in the town, and to place at the scene of the fatality a warn-



ing and some suitable means of assistance in case of emergency. (The latter is believed never to have eventuated).

The location selected for the memorial fountain was the eastern side of the Blackwood roundabout - today situated beside the Save the Children shop.

The fountain was hewn from Murray Bridge granite with the facia inscribed In memory of Frank Collins, who sacrificed his life in a vain attempt to save his friend, Rodney Saint, from drowning in the River Sturt on October 8, 1927. The cost of the memorial was met by local residents with the Mitcham District Council providing the site and ongoing maintenance.

In 1990, the Sunday Mail reported that vandals were continually pushing over the fountain and that it was badly damaged. Mitcham Council considered moving it in a bid to keep it safe.

However, no relocation occurred and the council has continued to maintain the fountain which is plumbed and fully func-



# Need to reduce our use of plastic

AUSTRALIANS use 130 kilograms of plastic per person each year and currently less than 12 percent is recycled into other products.

The previous state government banned single use plastic straws, cutlery and stirrers last year and polystyrene containers this year.

The next step to ban single-use plastic cups, lids, food containers and fruit and vegetable bags has gone to public consultation and we await the new government's response.

Businesses have easily transitioned to alternative paper, cardboard, bamboo and compostable plant-based products. Many businesses and events (such as Womadelaide) have gone plastic free.

Many other countries including Canada, the UK, most of the EU, and some US states have also been progressively banning various single-use plastic items; so we are in good company.

#### Plastic free July

For the past eleven years the global movement Plastic Free July has been working to help people reduce their use of plastic.

Over 100 million people worldwide have



signed up to the challenge where you receive regular tips and success stories on reducing plastic waste in the home, garden, workplace and school. Check out their website www. plasticfreejuly.org This July, I will have a box

into which I will place all plastic waste used over the course of the month, to get an idea of how much our household produces.

Awareness is the first step in making meaningful changes.

While it is important that we reduce our personal use of plastic and improve our recycling rates, the real problem is the production of too much plastic in the first place.

Organisations such as RedCycle do a great job with their soft plastic collection bins in Coles and Woolworths supermarkets. They would love to expand their operation to other sites but don't have enough demand from manufacturers making products from recycled plastic.

Their bins are always overflowing so we as consumers are taking recycling seriously.

We were, however, conned many years ago by product manufacturers who shifted the responsibility away from themselves for producing too much plastic onto us consumers to tidy up their rubbish.

Some governments are now considering



Extended Producer Responsibility legislation whereby producers are required to take full responsibility for what they produce.

Companies do not like this, but making more sustainable goods and reducing waste and landfill ultimately is cheaper. Governments need to be bold in requiring them to comply.

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## Motorists concerned about Kalyra speed bumps

A PROPOSAL to curb speed infringements on Kalyra Road in Belair has drawn opposition amongst the community, with some claiming a lack of proper consultation has resulted in a shortfall of well considered solutions.

After Mitcham Council received a request to review traffic movements in the area, a report to Council penned in 2018, noted that 15% of road users were over the speed limit coming down the steep suburban road.

In response to these concerns, Council officers installed traffic counters on Kalyra Road. Collected data has indicated that 85th percentile speed was recorded excessive as 65km/h on the 50km/h road. Council officers, therefore determined that traffic calming measures were warranted, based on the data collected and risks to road safety.

When a letter was sent to residents along Kalyra Road recently, proposing the installation of road cushions, in addition to new signage along the road, some in the community wondered why a broader consultation had not taken place, concerned that a solution had been assigned without thorough consideration.

However, Mitcham Council is planning for further consultation with the broader community and this will be undertaken shortly through the City of Mitcham's 'YourSay' platform.

Prior to undertaking engagement with the broader community, Council is consulting with the residents along Kalyra Road who are directly impacted by the proposed traffic management plan, as well as with residents from nearby streets including Randell Court, Marina Avenue, Gloucester Avenue, Caroline Avenue, Tree Top Terrace and Christine Avenue.

Meanwhile, Greg O'Grady, representative for the Mitcham Hills Road Network (MHRN) group, who monitor infrastructure projects in the area said the repercussions of the plan had not been thought out sufficiently.

"Kalyra takes a reasonable volume of traffic, especially at peak hour, which lessens the traffic at the Main Road end of Gloucester Avenue as a consequence," said Greg.

"This traffic calming may have undesirable outcomes for residents who are nearby the road cushions, particularly as cars then accelerate up the hill to the next one. There's devil

in the detail with stuff like this."

Another consideration was the thoroughfare of ambulances and emergency vehicles through the area. "Ambulances use that road, even just in ferrying patients to the aged care facility," Greg noted.

"Back in 2014, I was run over by a truck on my pushbike and suffered a fractured hip. The ride in the ambulance from Hendon, where the accident occurred to the Royal Adelaide, even with no speed humps was absolute agony.

Greg also received word that the CFS were not consulted for this proposal; "It sets off alarm bells that it could cause major issues in the case of an emergency," he said.

Others reflected O'Grady's sentiments on social media.

"In case of fire, how on earth will a safe evacuation take place! 50kph is already slow enough without having to negotiate the humps. I'm not anti 50 at all - there has to be a better solution." said one resident.

Another said improved signage would be enough to remedy the problem.

"Signage is inadequate. This is the only mention of speed on the up track of the road. I've therefore read it as 60km must be the

correct zoned speed with a lower 50km-suggestion-of-speed (as the signage suggests) to navigate the bend."

Discussion also addressed the results of the council traffic study, which found that no crashes had occurred.

"Without trying to sound like a hoon, there has not been a single accident on that road, let alone one attributed to speed. If the majority of cars are traveling at a modest 60 to 65kph (albeit illegal) without incident, maybe it is the speed limit that is the problem?

The addition of speed humps will just add to congestion, noise, pollution and will make the passage of buses difficult, given they already struggle up the hill. It will also just push traffic on to alternative roads like Marina Avenue," posted one local resident.

Greg concurred that increased signage would seem a sensible solution to increase awareness and potentially slow some motorists.

"And the traffic data from October 2018, where there was a recorded typical speed of 55km/h on the up track and 63km/h on the down track, is completely consistent with a 60km/h road," explained Greg.

'This area of the Adelaide Hills is so rich in diversity, it's a fabulous place to set a story,' says Claire, who describes herself as an avid birdwatcher and tame bushwalker, with an absorbing interest in human nature.

The story involves 15-year-old Bailey



Carpenter, who finds himself in an alternate time, when searching for a missing friend.

Evernow is written from the perspectives of Bailey and Emilia (his brother's girlfriend) and explores themes of loyalty, faith, nature and mental health.

Belair National Park informed the main setting, a fictional place called Camina National Park. Bailey's mind-bending adventure takes place with him and his friend Ed camping rough in the park, foraging for their food.

One reader asked, 'Can you really eat everything they ate?' The answer is, 'Yes, but...' Belberg carefully researched bush foods available in autumn at Belair (but, as she is quick to note, damaging plants in or removing them from a national park is illegal!).

Vivid descriptions of the bush and its inhabitants enrich a story about relationships under unusual stress. Read the novel and see if you can recognise your local national park!

From the blurb: Bailey's search takes him to a familiar place on a weirdly different time line. Finding the friend turns out to be the easy part, but now he's haunted by the memory of a brother and another life.

He and his friend enjoy living rough in the Australian bush, but it's not all it seems. Torn between worlds, Bailey faces opposition from his friend and the real possibility that he cannot return home.

as we have to transform school classrooms into a gallery," said Lyn.

"Along with most of our Rotary members and spouses, we

were privileged to have some help from some locals in the hills community.

"I also want to thank a number of volunteers from other local service clubs who help out alongside Rotarians during the exhibition open days.

"And of course, we are extremely grateful to all the people who generously buy some of the art on display to brighten up their home or office, and in doing so have supported artists and future community projects.

"Thank you to all involved, who have contributed to making the 2022 Rotary Art show such a great project again this year," said Lyn.

- You have been resident at your current address for one month and are not on the State electoral roll
- You are a sole owner/occupier of rateable property
- You are not an Australian citizen but you have been a resident at your current address for one month
- · You are a landlord for rateable property
- You are an organisation/business owner or occupier of rateable property
- You are a group of owners or occupiers of rateable property.

Enrolment forms are available at www.mitcham-council.sa.gov.au/council-elections or call Mitcham Council on 8372 8888.

'Weight loss world', diet culture, and the general media are awash with advice on what to eat, and how much. Mostly it's about calories, calories, calories


But in fact, safe and permanent reduction in body fat is about changing habits around eating: habits related to our treatment of ourselves, and around what, when, how and why we eat.


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# Bringing diverse multicultura groups together with soiree

#### Bringing diverse multicultural | How to avoid scams this tax season

TAX season is fast approaching and unfortunately, that means Australians could be hit with an influx of tax scams

A global leader in digital security and privacy is warning Australians to be extra vigilant over the coming months to avoid falling victim to a tax time scammer.

People right across the country will be looking to lodge their tax claims in the next months, giving cybercriminals a prime opportunity to seize, intercept and execute tax-related scams.

Often, these scammers pose as someone you know – or an institution you use – and offer an easy "fix" to a problem you have in an official-sounding way or even give the victim a sense of urgency that they must hand over their information to be cleared of a financial issue.

Stephen Kho, cyber security expert at *Avast* says, "We know these scams have been prevalent in high numbers over the last few years, so it's important to be on the front foot and know what to look out for when it comes to identifying fraudulent activity online, especially around tax time where we are having conversations around finances with various institutions."

"Cybercriminals are always looking for new ways to steal your data, personal details or money through increasingly sophisticated scams and online threats and the timeliness hook of tax time helps them seem more legitimate."

Stephen has shared three examples of prevalent tax scams to look out for, plus ways to avoid them.

 Fake tax preparers claiming they can do your tax return fast, and for a low price. These fake tax preparers often operate by accessing the myGov accounts of their clients and lodging their tax returns through the ATO's myTax web portal, or take your personal details and your payment, and then disappear.

#### How to avoid this scam:

- Check that your tax preparer is registered on the-Tax Practitioners Board (TPB). They may display the TPB logo on their website, but you should still double check to ensure they are legitimate. (https:// www.tpb.gov.au/registrations\_search)
- Never share your myGov password with anyone. Sharing your information (such as your myGov password) with an unregistered practitioner puts your personal and financial affairs at risk.
- Setup your myGov account to use two factor authentication. You can use either the myGov Code Generator app or receive a code by SMS when logging in. This will further protect you from unauthorised access to your myGov account.

- 2. ATO phishing scams used to trick you into giving them your sensitive information. These scams work by impersonating a trustworthy and reputable company or individual to gain access to information such as usernames, passwords or credit card numbers. In an Australian Taxation Office (ATO) phishing attack, the recipient will typically receive an "urgent" email, SMS or automated phone call claiming to be from the ATO with instructions to follow a link to log in or make a payment on an outstanding tax debt.
- How to avoid this scam:
- If you receive a phone call, SMS, or email from the ATO, don't click on links to log in to your account, send payments or provide any personal information.
   The ATO will never threaten you with immediate arrest, demand payment, or suspend your TFN. So, if you're not sure if it's the ATO contacting you, phone them directly using the phone number on their website to check.
- It's also worth installing a digital security product, like Avast One Essential, to protect you from any malicious software that you might download from a tax scam email, and using a secure browser with a VPN like, Avast Secure Browser, which has an Anti-Phishing solution in the desktop browser to defend against malicious threats when browsing the internet.
- 3. Emails posing as the CEO, director, or a payroll provider known as Business Email Compromise scams In a business email compromise scam, attackers target those with financial-related roles and sometimes even employees. They then send emails asking for copies of payroll details or PAYG payment summary forms, which include all the personal information a cybercriminal would need to steal someone's identity. These emails start with a friendly greeting before getting to the request, attempting to put those targeted at ease before asking for the forms or details

#### How to avoid this scam:

- If you work for a company, make sure to strictly follow your company's payment authorisation/approval
- Never send tax information electronically without first verifying with the sender in person or on the phone that they sent the request in the first place. It's worth taking the extra precaution, as the likelihood of this type of scam increases during tax season.

plant seedlings and regenerate thousands of hectares of unique Australian landscape.




Meal On Wheels (MOW) Blackwood are desperately in need of more drivers and meal deliverers
