



Contest for Boothby thrown wide open

WITH the Federal election now called for Saturday May 21, our local electorate of Boothby will be closely watched as a key seat in determining the outcome.

While the seat has been firmly held by the Liberal party since 1949, the party's dominance has waned over the past 20 years, especially since the current boundaries were first used

It now hangs as the most marginal electorate in the state, held at the 2019 election by a margin of only 1.4%.

As a result of the departure of Liberal MP Nicolle Flint, retiring after representing the seat since the 2016 election, the contest has been thrown wide open, with a range of potential

Do you know where this is?

IN 2022, the Blackwood Action Group (BAG) is taking a different approach with its monthly article, planning to encourage awareness of our local heritage. Under the title "Do you know where this is?"... each issue of The Blackwood Times will feature a

photograph of a local historic site. Readers are challenged to find its location, and thereby have a chance to win a prize.

The actual location will then be revealed in the following issue, and a brief description of the site and history.

THANKS to the people who entered last month's hidden sites competition ... the winners' names will be posted on the BAG website. Information about the location and history of the site that was published in the April 2022 edition follows ...

The wood and iron cells still visible behind the former Police Station and now Meals on Wheels building at 17 Coromandel Parade are a reminder of the days when Blackwood had its own police station.

The early history of the police presence in Blackwood is sketchy. However, it is known that in 1880 a building was erected on the land above the now Pinera Railway Station and let to the Police Department. The date is significant since it was when the first phase of the Adelaide to Melbourne train line was under construction.

The camp of almost 1,000 navvies building the line was located near the current Blackwood Railway Station. Alcohol flowed freely in the camp, much of which was purchased from the Blackwood Inn, now the Belair Hotel.



Local folk memory states that when the cells at the police station were full, usually on Saturday night, any further miscreants were tied to trees to sleep off their inebriation. Attempts by hastily built churches and the Temperance Movement in the district to curb this bad behavior were obviously only partially successful.

By 1903, the Police Gazette reported that a mounted constable had been temporarily stationed at Blackwood

In 1915, the district was vast and

rugged and the community was feeling uneasy. Young men were enlisting in the war and on top of that a body had been found near Eden Hills and the rumours were that it was of a spy.

As the year drew to a close, arrangements were being finalised for the appointment of women patrols as an adjunct to the police force as more young men left for the war. Later a gaol was built in Belair National Park, in part to deal with the poor behaviour of the visiting picnickers, who often brought dray loads of alcohol.

The Belair Police Station closed on 23 June 1930 and the new Blackwood police station on Coromandel Parade opened on the same day.

The standard red brick building is one of many similar stations located around the state. Holding cells were built at the back and the police horse was paddocked at the side. Community policing at this time of the Great Depression included issuing ration tickets and employment applications, as well as dealing with pilfering.

Until the early 1960s, the local sergeant granted drivers licences to young people answering a set of questions.

But life was more difficult for 'baby boomers' who had to reverse park between two sticks outside the police station under the watchful eye of the sergeant. If either of the sticks was hit, applicants automatically failed without a chance to demonstrate their practical driving skills.

The station's responsibilities gradually diminished until it was closed completely in 1999 amid much angst from the local community.

Today, the cells are used for secure (very secure) storage and the adjacent horse stable is home to Santa's Sleigh used in the annual Lion's Christmas Pageant.



The City of Mitcham is inviting feedback from the community on its draft 2022/23 Annual Business Plan, Budget & Long Term Financial Plan.

This is a community building budget that delivers significant investments in facilities to support active lifestyles and to strengthen community connections.

To support these community initiatives and to continue delivering the many existing services Council provides, Council is proposing to increase rates by an average of \$72 for residential and \$190 for commercial businesses (3.93 per cent).

Council is also seeking community feedback on a number of other state government projects funded as part of the state election process. If approved by Council, these projects will require ongoing maintenance and funding by Council.

Including all of these in the budget would result in the rate increase being \$78 for residential and \$205 for commercial businesses (4.26 per cent). Have your say by **5pm Saturday 21 May 2022** via:

Exciting future around new Hub precinct

WORKS on the Blackwood Community Hub & Library are progressing, with Schiavello Construction appointed as the builder for the project.

An onsite meeting was held with Mayor Heather Holmes-Ross, members of the Project Control Group, and representatives from Schiavello last month, to walk the site and to build the relationship between parties.

"We met with the project manager and were able to see the perimeter of where the new hub will be located," said Heather. "We are really happy that this tender has been awarded, and residents can expect to see progress very soon, with demolition of the old community centre to begin in May."

Following some initial delays due to the Omicron outbreak, the demolition of the buildings at the corner of Waite and Edwards Streets has been completed. This will now allow construction work of the North West Car Park to begin, this month.

It is anticipated that the car park will be utilised by building contractors, for their personal vehicles only, during the construction of the Hub building in order to reduce parking impacts on local streets for the public.

Staff associated with nearby key projects, including the Waite Reserve (currently unfunded), Young/Waite Street roundabout, and the Young Street redevelopment, continue to meet and ensure that awareness of various project timelines and requirements are communicated.

A \$1.6million commitment has recently been made to works in the precinct by the Federal Labor candidate for Boothby, Ms Louise Miller-Frost. "We are extremely grateful to Louise for her funding commitment for the Waite Street Reserve project," said Heather.

If elected, a Labor government would provide half the funding of the \$3.2 million project, which will see new landscaping, pathways, park furniture and play equipment in Waite Street Reserve; new links between the upgraded Blackwood Community Hub and surrounding businesses; and a pedestrian and vehicle shared zone to maximise parking, create a multiuse public area and improve pedestrian movement in Blackwood.

Heather said that while building supply shortages were causing some difficulties coordinating a timeline for the separate projects underway in the precinct, all parties were working together to ensure the best outcome.

"We have a commitment from the developer for the land around Young Street to try and do that work at a similar time to the library, so we should see exciting things in the near future," Heather said.

With works underway, the future of the current library site, along with neighbouring Karkoo Nursery which is also situated on the same parcel of council owned land, has yet to be determined.

"We are looking to put the site of the old library and the Karkoo Nursery on the market soon," said Heather. "The sale of the site is tied to the funding for the new Hub, so we expect to see some movement on it soon. I expect a decision will be made prior to Council elections, but no solid plans."

Karkoo was previously successful in gaining a lease extension to the end of 2022, and are currently operating an additional nursery site in Oakbank. Co-owner of Karkoo, Peter Rowat, said that while the Oakbank site is doing well, he hopes their lease can continue at Blackwood.

"We have told council that we are interested in buying the site, but it seems likely it will go to developers," said Peter.



"We did have some communication that nothing would happen with the site until the new Hub has been completed, and there is still a fair bit to go, so we are hopeful we can stay until that process has gone through. We will certainly be happy to stay as long as we can, as we have a lot of support from locals, so fingers crossed and we'll continue with business as usual."

Discussion has also been taking place regarding potential artwork for the Blackwood Community Hub site, in particular with regards to Kaurna recognition, culture and art.

A clear recommendation to come from the Draft Cultural Heritage Survey, which is still being finalised, was that the River Red Gum marked for removal on the site should be preserved and given back to the site, preferably in an artistic format that recognises the Kaurna culture and history of the Blackwood area.

Schiavello are aware of this requirement and will be working with the City of Mitcham and Kaurna representatives to store this gum appropriately on site until any work begins on the timber itself.

History of local libraries | First solo art exhibition

CITY OF MITCHAM COUNCILLOR AND

AS we move towards construction of the new Blackwood Community Hub in Young Street, Blackwood (comprising a library and community centre), I have put my amateur historian 'hat on' to tell the story of books and libraries of the Mitcham Hills.

In 1836, the first cargo of 200 books and pamphlets arrived in Adelaide, intended to provide a library to help educate the citizens of this new, enlightened and progressive society.

Unfortunately, the box was dropped by the crew of a ship's boat and had to be rescued from

Known as "The Gouger Collection", the books included 'Suggestions on the propriety

of re-introducing British convict labour into British North America'; 'An account of the colony of Van Diemen's Land' principally designed for the use of emigrants.

Memoirs, correspondence, and private papers by Thomas Jefferson Randolph; 'Sketch of the history of Van Diemen's Land', illustrated by a map of the island, England and America: a Photo - Coromandel Institute, Main Road; comparison of the social c1880s. Image c/o Coromandel Valley & and political state of both Districts National Trust. nations, in two volumes.

Locally, the Coromandel Institute (see photo above) was opened in 1881 as a centrally located community centre and library. The Institute building, which still stands at 404 Main Road, Coromandel Valley, was funded by residents and opened with a small number of subscribers and about 100 volumes.

This institute, like others of the time,

required membership fees to borrow books. Free libraries were a long way off.

Over the years the Institute contributed greatly to the community – not only a library but a space for celebrations, community projects, school break-ups, welcome home celebrations for soldiers, playing competitive table tennis,

Books came first to Blackwood c1903 via the Blackwood, Belair and Coromandel Valley Boys Club (BBCBC)located on the corner of Coromandel Parade and Garnett Avenue, Blackwood. The BBCBC provided a wide range of activities including a library but did not have the advantages of affiliation, such as the circulation of boxes of books to supplement the local collections of largely light reading

The Coromandel Valley Institute and the

BBCBC were at the core of the social and cultural life of the community for many years.

Nonetheless, these subscription/pay to use libraries hampered the rights of residents to access free public libraries long after their development in other states. Particularly disadvantaged were children whose reading needs were not met by the institute libraries.

Recognition by the State Government of the shortcomings of the insti-

tute libraries led in the 1940s, to the Country Lending and Children's Country Lending Services. Parcels of books arrived by train at the Blackwood Railway Station to be collected by readers.

"As well as my art practice, I am a singer and long serving member of the State Opera South Australia Ensemble having joined in 1973. I have been digitising and archiving the historical images of the opera company for the past ten years.

"Painting is challenging, but also it is a process of reflection, while the pottery making I do is a rather therapeutic process," said Rod.

Take the Community Bike Shed, which was started by a group of men who were initially looking for social companionship; which has now grown to about 30 members - both male and female.

They not only provide good quality, affordable reconditioned bikes for disadvantaged families, but are regularly filling shipping containers of these bikes to send overseas.

Another great benefit of this group, is they are recycling (pardon the pun!) bikes which would otherwise have ended up in landfill.

So, if you are looking for a reconditioned bike of any model, or want to donate a bike no longer needed, they meet on Monday mornings at the rear of the Blackwood Uniting Church (near the roundabout).

And then there's the Blackwood Lions Bargain Centre which also is involved in a project that has the benefit of keeping secondhand goods out of landfill. Open on Saturday mornings next to Karinya Reserve on Shepherds Hill Road, Eden Hills, the Bargain Centre carries just about every item and product you can think of - all secondhand but of good quality and very affordable ... from building materials to household goods to furniture and kitchenware.

The added bonus with this project is that proceeds from this Centre, (last year they celebrated a turnover of \$3 million since opening) find their way back into the local community, benefitting other groups and organisations such as CFS and SES, school scholarships, scout and girl guide groups, funding pergolas and barbeques at local reserves.

And the list goes on ... Blackwood Meals on Wheels, Blackwood Action Group, and all the local service clubs - Rotary, Lions and Probus who so richly contribute to this wonderful district we chose to live in ... and generally go about their business without any fanfare.

For example, take the annual Christmas Pageant held on the first Friday in December, which simply would not happen if not for all the volunteers from the local service clubs ... hopefully returning to Main Road this year on the first Friday in December.

THIS is what can happen when the wrong thing is placed in a kerbside bin. E-waste and batteries are increasingly causing fires in collection trucks.

When lithium batteries are disposed of in kerbside bins, they are compacted in the back of a truck, causing them to perforate and ignite.

"We urge residents to keep all batteries out of kerbside bins and take them to a designated drop off location for recycling," said a East Waste spokesperson.

Residents can take small quantities of

household batteries to the following locations:

* Most Council Civic Centres and Libraries

- * Most Council Civic Centres and Libraries have a collection point.
- The Battery Stewardship Council is rolling out collection bins across Australia at various retail points, including supermarkets.
- * ALDI and IKEA stores: take household batteries for recycling.
- * Battery World stores various locations (household and car batteries—small quantities)
- While car/automotive batteries can be taken to:
- Auto part retailers or service stations.
- Adelaide Waste and Recycling Centre, 181 Morphett Road, North Plympton.

Building materials also never should be disposed of in kerbside bins. Heavy materials such as bricks, tiles and scrap metal damage trucks and machinery. Building materials should be taken to a waste transfer station for recycling.






