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-Colebrook elders support need for a Voice

WITH the 'Voice' referendum to be held on Saturday, October 14, a number of former residents of Colebrook, asked Blackwood Reconciliation Group (BRG) for an opportunity to do some Truth Telling, and to speak about their history and why they believe a Voice for Aboriginal people is important.

So in early September, a gathering was arranged at Colebrook in Eden Hills, where stories were shared with guests as well as senior students from Emmaus Christian College and St John's Grammar school.

One of the participants, Graham McKenzie, 80 years old, was born in Adelaide to a Western Arrente mother and almost immediately placed in the original Colebrook Home at Quorn. Subsequently, along with other children, he moved to Eden Hills to grow up in the Blackwood area.

Raymond Finn, a Wangkangurru man, was removed from his large extended family at the age of 7, then brought down from his homelands near Marree in 1968. He was one of the last few children at Colebrook and managed to return to his family by the age of 12 when Colebrook closed.

Kunyi June-Anne McInerney, who was featured in our July article, was born to a Yankunytatjara mother and non-Aboriginal father near Oodnadatta, and removed along with her siblings at the age of 4.

Kunyi was placed in a series of foster homes while some sisters grew up at Colebrook, and she spoke of crying every night for her mother and being punished by her carers for doing that. There was further loss when one sister was taken to Papua New Guinea for adoption, and completely severed from her family until they managed to reconnect 5 years ago.

Raymond was already developing a strong sense of his Aboriginal identity when he was removed. He spoke of the shock of being the only 'black kid' in the whole of Blackwood Primary School, and of how 'a white mentality was flogged into him'.

He spoke of how lost he felt as a child, and of the overwhelming sadness that pervaded his everyday life, with no explanation of why this had happened to him and no opportunity to reconnect with family.

While Graham spoke of never being told why he was there or who his mother was. At Colebrook for 16 years, he experienced the full range of care, from the nurturing of Sisters Rutter and Hyde, to the outright abuse from subsequent superintendents.

He also spoke of the importance of his relationships with the other children in the home, with local Blackwood friends and his participation in Blackwood Football Club and Coromandel Valley Cricket club.

One of his local childhood friends, and later work colleague, Ian, joined us at Colebrook for the conversation. As

well as the value of sport and friendship, these clubs were the places that Graham encountered caring adults that gave him hope there were good people in the world.

They all identified how 'voiceless' they and their families were in the past. Their commitment today is to support the enshrinement of a Voice in the Constitution to ensure their children and grandchildren never have to go through anything similar.

They also spoke of the racism they still experience, and their desire to cut through the conflict that is circulating in the

community, to take a gentle approach that will enable people to understand the importance of a Voice into the future.

Thanks to the Blackwood Uniting Church, this conversation was recorded on video, and will be available to be viewed on the Church's Youtube channel by early October.

Community hub injects life into precinct

THE beginning of a new era has arrived for Blackwood, with the completion of 'Tiwu Kumangka' (Blackwood Community Library & Hub) building set to bring new vitality to the precinct.

The journey to build a new community hub was first touted in 2018, and following a lengthy process of consultation with several hurdles levelled at the project along the way, the newly completed Tiwu Kumangka will now offer the community a range of service provisions.

The 1,900m², two-storey building will host a public library on the ground floor, community facilities on the first floor, and north and south entries that open onto Waite Street Reserve.

Tiwu Kumangka also offers the community exciting new spaces and services including a community kitchen, a 'maker space' - a workshop area for learning; outdoor seating area, gallery space and digital lounge.

Traditional services include a range of flexible community meeting rooms/spaces supported by a kitchen servery, public toilets, lounge areas, dedicated children's and youth areas, an integrated toy library, collection spaces, and information/ customer service desk. Administrative, delivery, storage, and processing areas are also included.

Mitcham Mayor, Dr Heather Holmes-Ross was delighted that the project had now reached fruition. "This is the end of a 35 year journey for a new library in Blackwood, when the former site was moved into as a "temporary" measure," she said.

"We are so happy to be able to offer our community the contemporary library and community centre that they have waited so long for. Having a library and community centre co-located is the direction that modern centres are going, and it's a great design because it brings together all these amenities, and it will service the needs of the community so well."

Heather also commented on the beautiful finishing touches of the site. "I have no doubt it will become the centrepiece of Blackwood which it was designed to be," she said. Tiwu Kumangka is just part of the planned development for the precinct, which next year will see an upgrade to Young Street, and the Waite Street Reserve, along with a pedestrian walkway linking Tiwu Kumangka to the adjacent shopping complex housing Drakes Foodland, Blackwood Health Foods and Shakespeares Books.

"We are very pleased to offer these projects at around the same time," Heather explained, "as we believe it heralds a new era for the tasteful redevelopment of the Blackwood centre."

In response to some confusion regarding the naming of the site, Heather noted that 'Tiwu Kumangka' was the official title of the building, and that the library which is housed within, may receive its own name in course.

"Tiwu Kumangka is the name of the building, and it houses the Blackwood library and community centre," she said. "Buildings do have names, and this is what we have determined this one will be called. There has been a motion which says there will be some kind of memorial or remembrance of Ivor Symonds, but it has not been decided what or where that will be. It may end up as the name of the library, but that is yet to be formally determined."

The former library site is now on the market, and has received several promising tenders, with council staff in the process of assessing their merits. A report on the expressions of interest is set to be brought before council to determine which, if any, will gain approval.

"What we are looking for as a council is something with retail or commercial use at the ground level, and housing above," Heather said. "We would like to see something very tasteful and usable."

It is hoped that the development upon the former library site will further encourage vitality in the centre, and in turn meet the requirements of State Government plans to increase housing density across metropolitan areas.

"We intend that by increasing density in the business centre, we are able to better preserve the feel and size of blocks of the suburban surrounds," Dr Holmes-Ross said.

Concerned groups come together to help struggling families put food on the table

A NEW project to assist families struggling with the rising cost of living around the Blackwood area, is set to bring the Beacon emergency relief service back to better meet the needs of the community.

Beacon, an emergency relief service provided through the Mitcham Hills Inter-Church Council, unfortunately has not been running since Covid began to take its toll on the community. However, with cost of living pressures increasing, Tracey Yeend of the Green Dispensary in Blackwood, began noticing the need for a community assistance program.

"It started out of noticing a couple of people coming into the pharmacy not being able to pay for their medication," Tracey said.

"Through chatting with them, I found that they were struggling even purchasing food. From that, I started a conversation with local MP for Waite, Catherine Hutchesson, and we brought together the Blackwood Church of Christ and Blackwood Lions to discuss what could be done to help.

Through this initial meeting, it was discovered that 130 families had asked for food help that week in the Blackwood area.

"I had provided what assistance I could through the pharmacy, but we thought we needed to do something bigger, so we looked into relaunching Beacon, which folded because of lack of demand in 2021.

The Blackwood Lions Club, Blackwood Action Group, Church of Christ, Zonta of Adelaide Hills, Catherine Hutchesson MP and The Green Dispensary have now come together to relaunch Beacon as "Beacon 24".

"We will provide a family food for 24 hours and a pathway to find additional help," explained Tracey.

"We are running the project in a way which is feasible, because if there is a big demand, we can't provide bundles for a week. But we are able to point people in the direction of further help, and be there in moments of crisis as an important assistant.

"We have devised quite a specific list (see on right) so we don't get random stuff donated, and the beauty of this, is it is not going to be just a Church of Christ initiative anymore. We are bringing many community groups in the area to join together to make this successful."

The project will allow residents in need to make their way to various collection points, ensuring the availability of a 24-hour pack at a couple of different locations, but the Church of Christ's foundational service has still provided an invaluable start point to reignite the new initiative.

"We will still be using the Church of Christ as a base where Beacon was before, and fortunately, they haven't done anything to alter the storage room since the former service was

1950s 'snapshot' of life in the Mitcham Hills



This year, the Blackwood Action Group History team is using the monthly headlines from the 1955 editions of the 'Coromandel Newspaper' to provide readers with a 'snapshot' of life during the 1950s ...



'Banks expanded to meet demand from growth in district'

THE first bank in Australia started in 1817, with the Savings Bank of South Australia founded some 30 years later, being the first in SA.

In the Blackwood district, the English Scottish & Australian Bank (ES&A) is believed to be the first bank to open on the corner of Main Road and Young Street.

"....Mr. Reg Gribble...opened the Blackwood branch on February 2, 1926, singlehanded, with a table and chair in the front room of the then existing house... he has seen the town and district grow from a mere hamlet to a busy and thriving centre..." (Coromandel newspaper, 26 March 1954).

In 1957 a prominent, architecturally designed new bank building opened on the same site, later becoming the ANZ Bank.

The Bank of Adelaide (later Savings Bank of SA and today Bank SA) originally operated from Edges Electrical Store. "The Bank of Adelaide has moved into handsome new premises... Mr. Perce Moore, the genial manager of the branch since its opening in 1953... said that the customers of the Bank would be able to carry out their business in a spacious and attractive atmosphere. Provision had been made for the increased volume of business which was inevitable with the continued progress of the Blackwood district by installing three tellers' compartments and an enquiry counter, together with offices for the Manager and Accountant..." (Coromandel, 25 July 1958)



In the grounds alongside the Integrated Health Solutions (IHS) practice on Laffers Road Belair is the Cherington Therapeutic Community Garden.



In late June, they had over 20 participants at their 2023 Golf Course Revegetation session, helping put some native flora back into the old golf course, thanks to funds raised by the Belair Hotel and the Belair National Park Action Group.

A later than usual planting happened in early August with a group of Certificate 2 students from TAFESA Urrbrae - Conservation and Ecosystem Management. They planted seedlings grown from seeds collected onsite by students in 2022.

All this was made easier thanks to a generous donation from Trail Running SA, which was put to use buying an auger and drill to make digging the holes a breeze!

"The Friends of Belair National Park acknowledge and welcome this support and feel we should publicly thank all those who have donated time or funds," added Pete.

"It's great to see so many community organisations working together, and we can't wait to see the plants flourish."

Cats best kept at home for their own safety

Neighbours tell me they have been concerned in the past about this cat. Apparently from next year, cats will have to be kept within your property. That can't come soon enough for me. Too late for these 3 little victims though."

THE Dog and Cat Management Board are encouraging cat owners to keep their pets safe at home.

A spokesperson for the Dog and Cat Management Board said an increasing number of cat owners were keeping their cats indoors or having enclosures built for them.

"Cats are perfectly happy living inside or using outdoor enclosures. There is no need for them to roam and there are many benefits to securing them on your property. They are less likely to get injured in fights with other cats, catch diseases from other cats or get hit by cars.

"From a community point of view, being a responsible cat owner reduces neighbourhood disputes and nuisance cat issue complaints to local councils.

"We would love to see people keeping their cats off the streets and encouraging their friends and families to do the same."

The board is also urging people to desex and microchip their cats. "Owners won't contribute to the problem if they desex their cats. Cats that are allowed outside have even an greater risk of producing unwanted litters.

"Too many kittens are born every year and there are just not enough homes for all of them."

Also keeping a cat within your property reduces the possibility of them being exposed to infectious diseases such as FIV, Feline Panleukopaenia, Feline Calicivirus, Feline Herpesvirus and Ringworm.



"House cats lead longer, healthier lives than cats allowed to roam, which are prone to injuries, illness or early death from fights, disease and road accidents..

"Most cats adjust well to staying home whether that's indoors or within your garden. The key is to make their indoor lives as enriching and intriguing as the outdoors."

Each year, the RSPCA and Animal Welfare League receives an average combined total of around 9700 cats, the vast majority of them abandoned, stray or lost.

Of the 1425 animals brought into RSPCA care via their rescue team last year, more than half were cats and kittens.

Dog and Cat Management Board spokesperson said, "it is mandatory for pet cats to be desexed, microchipped and registered in Dogs and Cats Online.

"Dogs and Cats Online is the state's official dog and cat register, and is the first port of call councils, vets, and shelters use to help reunite lost pets with their families.

"While some council's charge cat registration fees, and most don't; if you own a cat, it is mandatory to register it by its microchip in Dogs and Cats Online and this provides peace of mind that if your cat does become lost, it can be reunited with you."








Recent research in the Northern Territory has concluded that Aboriginal people are less likely to succumb to hot weather stress than non-indigenous people, despite them having poorer housing conditions and poorer health generally.

It concluded that "Aboriginal culture, and knowledge of the environment has enabled them to have extraordinary resilience to extreme weather".

Dr. Simon Quilty from the Australian National University says that listening to Indigenous people and understanding their cultural resilience to heat, is vital in adapting for the future with hotter weather becoming the norm.

We are locked into higher temperatures due to our past and continuing burning of fossil fuels.

Quilty's research confirms the benefits of Aboriginal, and other old cultures in hot climates, organising their days to work hardest in the mornings and evenings, while resting during

the hottest parts of the day. This is free, has no carbon footprint and benefits our physical and mental health.

It will require some re-thinking of our work culture, but we are up for that.

(Designing our buildings and cities to better cope with a changing climate is still important and will be explored in a future article.)

Spending most of our day in air conditioning reduces our ability to acclimatise, and makes us more vulnerable to heat stress. Taking heed of traditional knowledge can help our bodies adapt to hotter weather.

There is much wisdom we can learn from Aboriginal people who see themselves as integral parts of the whole natural environment, dependent on a thriving nature for humans to also thrive.

This will become increasingly important for our future survival. Aboriginal people are graciously willing to share this knowledge, and we would benefit from listening to their voices.

We can all benefit from a greater appreciation of the natural world as something that we should live in harmony with, rather than being just resources to chop down, dig up and pollute, to satisfy our profligate consumer lifestyle.

To have a sustainable future to leave to our descendants, let alone to live comfortably in a hotter climate; we need to have a more respectful relationship to the natural world, something our First Nations peoples have had for some 65,000 years.

The El Nino also has implications for the Murray Darling Basin. SA is at the "bottom" of the Murray-Darling

system and hence we get all of the nutrients and salts from the entire catchment.

Unless we have sufficient flows to keep the Murray Mouth open and wash the nutrients out to sea, the water at the bottom of the river system - the Coorong and its RAMSAR listed wetlands, the Lower Lakes, and the lower river system - becomes unusable for stock and for domestic use, and toxic to the environment. Murray water is piped to Adelaide and as far as the Eyre and Yorke Peninsulas for domestic use we need healthy water.

And yet of the 450GL of environmental flows required, only 2GL has been achieved to date.

The Murray Darling Basin Bill introduced to Parliament by Minister Tanya Plibersek in September gives an extension in deadlines, additional funding and additional options for achieving the flows.

Options include infrastructure projects to ensure more efficient use of water, and voluntary buy-backs.

Systemically, we need to transition to net zero as quickly as possible. The Federal Government's 43% emissions reduction target by 2030 has already mobilised international funding to invest in renewable projects in Australia.

When the Albanese Government was elected, renewables sat at 33%. Just over a year later it is at 40%, but we need to get to 82% by 2030.

There are a record 102 renewable projects in the pipeline - and the faster we transition to cheap renewable energy, the faster we can transition away from expensive fossil fuels, which expose us to international energy market prices.

THE Lions Club of Blackwood, along with the whole community, is happy to report that the impact of the long running Covid pandemic is almost over ... however, it seems that it will continue to impact on our lives in many and varied ways ... whether to wear a mask or not, should you still isolate if you get Covid?

"Meanwhile, the Lions Bargain Centre on Shepherds Hill Road at Eden Hills, which is the mainstay of our Club's fundraising activities, continues to thrive," said Chris Martin, Blackwood Lions Club spokesperson. "Donations of high quality goods from the generous Adelaide Hills community, is one of the main reasons our weekly sales continue to grow, which allows our Club to support many local and national projects."

As well as raising much needed funds that assist with community programs, and help numerous other local clubs and organisations, the Bargain Centre is indirectly helping the environment, by preventing tonnes of goods and items ending up in landfill.

"Due to the increased demand and patronage at the Lions Bargain Centre, there is a plan to expand the undercover storage area, and over the past twelve months we have been working on securing the funding to under take that build," explained Chris.

"Work is due to commence by the end of October and when completed, will increase the storage/display area available by some 30%. This will result in the ability to accept more saleable goods and lead to increased sales, allowing the Club to increase their support for the local community.

"A big thank you goes out to Mitcham Council and the Federal Government for their financial support for this building project," added Chris.

Blackwood Lions Club members have contributed in excess of 10,000 volunteer hours over the past year; and this equates to approximately \$40,000 worth of paid labor.

by the Blackwood Lions Club is offering the means of saving lives.


The Emergency Medical Information (EMIB) booklet, available from
