Unsealed fire track up for review again

CONTENTION among Belair residents has arisen over care for a local fire track, with a longstanding debate headed to Mitcham Council for potential reevaluation.

The track at Grevillea Way, which is a partly sealed road leading into an unsealed track, has been the source of significant community frustration over a number of years.

Grevillea Way links between Gloucester Avenue and Gulfview Road, providing an alternate access between Belair and Blackwood. Council considered a report on options for Grevillea Way in 2007, which debated closing the road with the exception of emergency vehicles, or sealing the track as a one or two way road.

"Several proposals have been put forward to the community over the years, and there has been strong local opposition against upgrading the fire track to a fully sealed road," said Mitcham Councillor Tom Morrison.

The public debate concerning the unsealed section of Grevillea Way culminated in Council embarking upon a "road closure" process, which was terminated due to an investigation and assessment by the Ombudsman's Office in 2008.

Following this, a review of the signage, delineation and management regime of the "unsealed section" of Grevillea Way was undertaken, and improvements were implemented to increase road safety for users of this link.

Since that date, arrangements have been made to routinely inspect, and as required, conduct maintenance on the unsealed road surface.

With the costing implications of upgrading the road having last been looked at in 2011, Tom recently queried Council Administration on the history of the track, with Cr Karen Hockley following up by forwarding a motion seeking to reevaluate the usage and costing data of surfacing the track to Australian Standards of a road.

Belair resident Iain Robilliard, who has a background in mechanical engineering, wrote to Mitcham Council with questions regarding the way the statistics were used in the 2008 process, claiming they were not an accurate reflection of community sentiment at the time.

"In the beginning, Grevillea Way was a part sealed road on the northern end, and part sealed road on the southern end. For reasons that are now not general knowledge, the connection was not completed," said Iain.

"I speculate this was due to the creek in the Ashby Reserve requiring significant roadworks to bridge the area and allow the sealing of the roadway. It may be connected to the donation of the lands of Ashby Reserve and Waitaparinga Reserve as part of the whole area development. The simple fact is, the unsealed section remained undeveloped at all: Gazetted, but not defined in any apparent way.

"The reason the attempt at closure by Administration and Council was halted in 2008, was that a local resident's group opposing closure, took the closure and it's process [being two distinctly different things] to the State Ombudsman, who investigated the process used by Council Administration, and found it failed to comply to the required process, and ordered that the projected closure could not proceed," explained Iain.

"Investigation by a road designer who consulted with the group that defeated the attempted closure of this unsealed section in 2008, produced evidence that Grevillea Way was a gazetted public roadway over its entire length, including the unsealed section running through the Ashby Reserve, which Reserve now appears as the eastern part of the Waitaparinga Reserve

"The dominant reason for households, particularly those of Grevillea Way itself, in calling for closure was undoubtedly the increase in traffic expected as a result of leaving the roadway open.

"My view is that Grevillea Way cannot be closed. It is the only other access road for over 360 households in the event Gloucester Avenue is closed for any reason, such as a bushfire.

"For the safety and health of residents in this area, the unsealed section should be sealed and guttered with proper drainage. Remedial work needs be considered for the creek in the Ashby Reserve. The deviation onto Ashby Reserve triggered by the Gum Grove intersection creation also needs to be resolved."

Cr Morrison welcomed further insights into the road.

"I think a lot of this frustration is because of a lack of written history / formal knowledge, rather than everyone having a different history, about the road.

"As it gets a substantial amount of use, the re-grading work done on it does not last for very long. Understandably, this results in a lot of local residents questioning why it isn't just sealed. I believe there will be further discussions regarding Grevillea Way over the coming Council term."

Students work to bring bandicoots back to park

A GROUP of Year 5 students from Coromandel Valley Primary School, with a passion for the environment, started working together with a desire to bring bandicoots back to Frank Smith

They attended the Southern YELP (Youth Environmental Leadership Program), facilitated by Green Adelaide, City of Marion and City of Onkaparinga.

Through YELP, Green Adelaide Educators support primary schools to plan and implement hands-on environmental projects that improve the sustainability of their campuses and communities. They learn valuable team skills, access resources and are linked to experts.

"The students chose Frank Smith Park as their project location, because it was close by and somewhere they wanted to make a change," explained Sarah Todd, Coromandel Valley Primary School's science teacher. A Green Adelaide 'Grassroots' grant application was submitted and won by Sarah, with the intention to use the money to purchase motion sensor cameras, provide information brochures to local community centres, construct bandicoot bungalows (artificial homes) and to revegetate.

Green Adelaide ecologist Dr Elisa Sparrow, visited the group several times to speak about how the bandicoot is vital for a healthy ecosystem and to initially set up the cameras.


Currently, the group has cameras out in Frank Smith Park capturing visits from the Southern Brown Bandicoot (critically endandered species) as well as local pest and pet species.

"We had our first sighting, two days after setting up the first camera. There have been several other sightings which have been registered on the Bandicoot Superhighway project webpage,



to map the location of this species.

"For bandicoots to really have a go at making the Frank Smith Park reserve their home, the whole community will need to get behind the project as dogs, feral cats and litter can be a big problem for their safety," added Sarah.

To sell or not to sell ... is the timing right?

PRIME real estate along Main Road Blackwood will be open to expressions of interest for development proposals, with the Blackwood Library and Karkoo Nursery sites heading to market.

In 2016, Mitcham Council resolved to colocate a new library and community centre on the existing Blackwood Community Centre site on Young Street/Waite Reserve, with further resolutions supporting the future sale of the land parcel at 207-211 and 213-17 Main Road, Blackwood, subject to the building of the new library and community centre, with the aim of recouping some of the associated building costs.

The land area comprises around 5,000 square metres within a 400 metre walk from the nearby Blackwood railway station, making the site a prime location for urban redevelopment, which Mitcham Council Mayor, Dr Heather Holmes-Ross says is key to revitalising the lagging business precinct of Blackwood.

"We know the Blackwood centre has been on a downward spiral," Heather notes. "There have been reports on the atrophy of the area going back 15 years; it is a priority of this council to reverse that atrophy and start building a vibrant precinct."

The first step to revitalisation is the new community centre and library facility, Tiwu Kumangka.

"We know that once Tiwu Kumangka is opened it will attract more visitors, there is data that tells us this will happen," says Heather.

"To stimulate business in the precinct, there needs to be more foot traffic, and we think the best way of doing this is to have people actually living within it."

State government planning reforms for new developments have meant significant changes are beginning to take place in terms of the height and types of buildings being constructed in urban and suburban areas.

"Rezoning allows us to go higher than we could have in the past. From our point of view, we have to increase density, we are required to do that by the State Government. We feel the best place to have that density is around the transport hub and business precinct. By increasing density along the main road, we hope that will slow or halt an increase in density in the surrounding suburban areas," explained Heather.

"We want to provide housing diversity, in particular for older members of our community looking to downsize and live in very close proximity to the Blackwood precinct.

"There are many people in the community who have raised their families here, who are getting to an age where they want a downsize, and don't want to be reliant on driving to get to the shops. So we are trying to provide that for our community."

Within Mitcham Council's callout for expressions of interest, applications will be favoured which deliver a multi-level mixed use development, including an activated main road frontage which comprises multiple commercial tenancies, and featuring a range of apartment sizes and choices including affordable housing, and high quality, sustainable design outcomes. Single use, 'big box' developments are explicitly being discouraged from application.

"We don't want an ugly box development," quickly, because it is al says Heather, "we want something which is the Blackwood precinct."





Karkoo expresses interest in buying their site

KARKOO Nursery, who currently occupy a portion of the Mitcham Council owned land to hit the market, will reach the end of their lease in July, but plan to stay until a decision on the sale is reached.

"We have said we would want to put in an expression of interest, though it's been indicated we likely won't be successful," said Karkoo co-owner Peter Rowat.

"Our lease ends in July and then we are on two months notice, so we will stay until there is a decision made.

"The flipside is that it's forced us to find a new site in Oakbank, which has been a positive and it has been a great opportunity for

"Most of our regular customers have made the trip out to the Oakbank site; it's worth the journey as the site is bigger and better. Plus we have just put in a new kitchen which will be up and running for Easter and Mothers Day."

Peter said the business will be keeping an eye out for another suitable site around Blackwood, though the nature of their requirements mean there are few tenancies large enough to accommodate their needs.

"There aren't really many sites in terms of finding the amount of land we need to properly run a nursery, obviously land is at a premium so we've been able to develop the Oakbank site in ways we haven't been able to in Blackwood."

going to reflect the things that people like about living in the area - open space, trees, green areas.

"We want that to be reflected in the building, so we would expect the type of design would allow for some individual outdoor spaces, and we believe its really important that it's built sustainably and designed for a changing climate, so our hope is that it will be highly livable and cheap to run."

While there was general support for the project within Council, some questioned the timing of the sale, with local councillors Karen Hockley, Darren Kruse and Tom Morrison voting against the motion.

"While the site needed to be sold at some point in time, going to market now seemed premature to me," said Tom of the decision.

"I think many in the community will be surprised. Maximising financial return for the site, while trying to meet community expectations over what will be built there, will be challenging.

"Construction costs are high, and I do not believe we have a proper understanding of what the site was worth when making the decision. Additional Council and State Government projects in the area could add substantial value to the land, such as a much awaited second pedestrian crossing and my desire to get a public greening strategy done for Main Road."

Heather said the sale was budgeted into the cost of the Tiwu Kumangka building, however, and with the completion fast approaching the time was right to go to market.

"We are expecting the new building to be finished around the end of July to early August, with an opening in early September. At that point the current library site will be empty.

"We would like this development to happen quickly, because it is all about reinvigorating the Blackwood precinct." □

Gain an understanding of what Easter means

"ONE of the iconic songs of Easter across the world is the famous Via Dolorosa", said Brandon Chaplin, Senior Pastor of Blackwood Hills Baptist Church.

"And it will be sung this Easter in over 150 countries and heard by millions."

The background to the song is that "Via Dolorosa" is a street within the Old City of Jerusalem. It is a Latin term, and translated into English means "Way of Grief," "Way of Sorrow," "Way of Suffering" or simply "Painful Way". This was the path Jesus took carrying his cross on his way to Golgotha.

In 2015, a tradition began in Blackwood with a re-enactment of the "Via Dolorosa", like on that first Good Friday 2,000 years ago. Each year around 500 people have lined the footpath on Coromandel Parade to witness the event (see photo on right).

"It has certainly gained some momentum since 2015, despite the pandemic years," reflected Brandon. "You don't see that kind of thing every day in the streets of Blackwood. It has been both striking and solemn to witness someone dressed as Jesus walking the 400 metres or so from Simla Parade to our church building with hundreds crowded to watch it."

In some countries around the world, it is a cultural tradition to enact the events of the first

Good Friday. From South America to Europe and back to North America some towns and villages take the opportunity to remind people about the events of the first Good Friday.

"The feeling among the people was one of serious reflection," added Brandon. "A car or two had to slow down to have a look at what was going on. Many people found it very emotional as they follow the Jesus into the church, at which point our Good Friday service begins."

This tradition will continue in Blackwood on Good Friday from 9.30am on Friday April 7.

"We plan for 'Jesus' to walk south from Simla Parade toward the church at 72 Coromandel Parade and then enter in. We then hope, that the crowd that gather will follow in and join us in our service of reflection that begins at 10am," said Brandon.

"People want to engage with that first Easter story and seek to get an understanding of what it means. People are very welcome to attend any of the services over the Easter weekend, not just Good Friday."

Easter Services at Blackwood Hills Baptist Church are at 10am on Good Friday, and on Easter Sunday at 10am and 7pm.

The scourge of endless plastic

WITH the demise of the REDcycle soft plastic recycling scheme, we are once again confronted with what to do with masses of plastic



The only current solution is to put it in the rubbish bin where it ends up in landfill; not a good outcome

Coles and Woolworths have advised that they are looking to re-establish the scheme, but it will take some time to roll it out. And, it isn't the real solution to the endless amount of plastic that so many things are packaged in.

Supermarkets are progressively changing over to compostable produce bags which is a useful small step, but they continue to avoid responsibility for creating so much plastic waste in the first place.

Australia produces more single-use plastic per person than any other country and it keeps increasing.

Some traders in Blackwood are supporting customers in reducing the use of plastic packaging.

- Country Meat is encouraging customers to bring their own plastic containers rather than collect more plastic bags.
- Similarly, The Fish Man is happy to put fish in our plastic containers.
- Baker's Delight allows us to bring back our bread bags (and tags) to be refilled, or alternatively they have paper bags available.
- Botanic Chickens use paper and cardboard for their take-away hot food.
- Blackwood Health Foods shop has many items for sale in bulk where we can use our own containers. They also have paper bags available for many items.
- Supermarket staff will wrap deli goods in plain paper instead of the plastic lined paper if we ask them. They are often reluctant because they have been trained to always do it in plastic lined paper, but we are the customers and we can insist.

I am sure there are many more local examples where shops are happy to reduce plastic use. It is always worth asking them about alternatives and congratulating them when they do.

We have only collected a few new plastic bags so far this year. We are always on the lookout for bulk alternatives and things packaged in paper rather than plastic.

And we are constantly re-using the same plastic bags when we go shopping, as well as using the mesh produce bags that are now readily available.

Habits are just that – things we do because we have always done them a particular way. But they can be changed if we are serious about doing things better.

Autumn is time for productive garden activity

THE SUMMER heat is past, and if the garden was productive, there will be an abundance of veg to be harvested and used.

Rich reward after all the labour of love in nurturing and tending the veg as they grow. Eager anticipation of the tomatoes ripening red and juicy. The harvest giving immense satisfaction and reward, not to mention the beneficial aspects of food gardening contributing to lower cost of living as well as the therapeutic benefits such as stress relief and physical exercise and a sense of accomplishment in producing healthy, best tasting food for the family.

Its time for thinking about cool season crops in the garden like the brassica family!

Broccoli, cauli, cabbage and kale are the favourites, but home gardeners have options for different vegetables like kohlrabi, an heirloom variety that is gaining popularity for its delicious, nutty, crunchy-textured bulb.



Other lesser-known Italian broccoli varieties like Romanesco or Spigariello are all delicious and fun to grow. Red cabbages, purple or green cauliflowers and purple sprouting broccoli all give gardeners scope for creativity and fun.

Give children a patch of their own and let their delight develop with snow peas or quickto-grow bok choy. When children have had a hand in the growing and harvesting, they will have an enthusiastic appreciation of the vegetables on their dinner plate.

All of this yield from the garden helps to

reduce the spiralling cost of living as well as enabling good recycling practices such as composting. A few chooks in the backyard make a great recycling loop: feed them the veg scraps and greens and in return you get fabulous eggs for the kitchen and a manure supply for the compost heap, which in turn feeds the garden.

The Cherington House Therapeutic Community Garden in Belair is a demonstration and educational garden highlighting the benefits – and just plain fun – of productive gardening.

We welcome anyone on Wednesday mornings between 10am-12:30pm to learn and to share the joy of producing organic fruit and vegetables.

Once a month Conversations in the Garden and Q&A with experienced gardeners is held. The next Conversation is on Wednesday 19 April, 10am to 12:30pm.

Pets who give you fresh eggs at home

CHICKENS are sweet, funny, and inquisitive animals which can make wonderful family pets. While all pets are important, chickens are the only common pet which have the added advantage of giving you eggs to eat at

So if you're thinking about getting some pet chickens, you'll need to consider a few things:

• What breed suits your family? Isa Brown and Rhode Island Red chickens are two of the most common breeds in Australia. They produce a lot of eggs and are very friendly but are more prone to illness then some of the less common breeds.

There are many other breeds with lots of different traits, so there will be a chicken to suit your home.

· Do you want to raise your own chicks or

buy older chickens? Young chicks are cute, fun, and will bond very closely with the family but they do take a lot of work. You may also end up with a rooster and need to be prepared for what to do if they start crowing and waking up the neighbours. Older chickens (often sold as "point of lay") may take a little longer to settle in but will bond well with time but you will know if they are female or male and are easier to look after.

 Do you have a safe place to house them? No matter where you live in Adelaide snakes and foxes can access your yard so you will need to have a safe, enclosed nesting box inside a coop to keep your chickens safe, particularly at night. You will also need to have secure fences as some chickens are very good climbers and jumpers. They will also need to be protected from the weather.

How many chickens do you want? Chickens like to live in small groups and are often unhappy if they are alone. Having too many chickens can lead to diseases. Most backyards will house 2-4 chickens comfortably.

It is best to buy chickens which have been

vaccinated. Most chicken vaccines are given in the egg or when they are one day old and protect against diseases which cannot be treated if they do get sick.

It is important to remember that chickens are a long term commitment and not just a cute Easter present. Some breeds can live for 10 years or more.

Koala bellow can be frightening at night

KOALAS may look adorable, but the noises they make can be downright terrifying.

The Department of Environment, Water and Natural Resources Animal Welfare Manager, Dr Deb Kelly, said many people were surprised the first time they heard a male koala bellow.

"The noise sounds like a cross between a pig and a hippopotamus and it seems too loud to be coming from an animal that size," Dr Kelly said.

"The males bellow to let females know they are around and also to warn off other males, so the noise factor increases during the spring and summer breeding season.

"A territorial fight between two males involves a lot of screaming, scratching and biting, and female koalas can be quite loud as well, as they have a piercing squeal.

'Koalas are at their most mobile in the warmer months, with both sexes looking for mates and the young males trying to claim territory, so unfortunately, this is also when we start to see more koalas getting hit by cars.

"It's also a good idea to keep dogs under control. A dog can do a lot of damage to a koala, but a koala has long, strong claws of its own and it will use them to defend itself.

"As the weather warms up, we'll see koalas sitting in non-native trees as a way of controlling their body temperature, because the European varieties tend to be cooler than eucalypts," Deb said.

"If you see a koala sitting on the ground for an extended period, or it appears to be injured or sick, or it's a young joey without a mother, then it's time to call Fauna Rescue's Koala Hotline on 7226 0017.

Otherwise, just leave them to it."

Don't be scammed when you're looking to buy a dog or cat

BEFORE purchasing a family dog or cat, South Australians are urged to first check the seller meets the relevant laws

In South Australia, anyone who sells a dog or cat they have bred must be registered in Dogs and Cats Online (DACO) ... if they're not, then don't purchase from them!

A Dog and Cat Management Board spokesperson explained dog and cat advertisements must include 'DACO' breeder numbers, names and phone numbers of everyone involved in the breeding or sale of the animal.

"It's easy to search Dogs and Cats Online to make sure the seller is registered by selecting 'breeder search' on the home page.

"Breeders and sellers must also follow the South Australian Standards and Guidelines for Breeding and Training Companion Animals. The guidelines are regulated under the Animal Welfare Act 1985, and Animal Welfare Regulations 2012 to weed out breeders who put profits before animals.

"Sellers must also microchip dogs and cats before sale and explain desexing laws and any known health issues to their purchasers."

All dogs and cats born after 1 July 2018 must be desexed by six months of age.

Finally, you must register your dog or cat in Dogs and Cats Online by the microchip number the seller

These laws apply to anyone who breeds and/or

sells dogs and cats, including owners of 'accidental' litters and rescue groups.

"It's also good practice to visit the facilities to see that you're comfortable with the environment in which the animal was bred, and beware of online scams ... it's unwise to pay for something unseen.

Advertisements without a valid DACO breeder number should be reported to your local council.

While Consumer & Business Services (CBS) has advice if you are buying a puppy:

Be aware that not everyone who claims to have dogs for sale is a legitimate seller.

Some are outright scammers - they take large deposits upfront with no intention of ever supplying a puppy - while some other sellers fall short in meeting all their legal obligations.

When buying a puppy:

- the safest option is to only buy a pet you can meet in person
- seek advice from a reputable breeders association, vet or local pet shop
- research the seller
- do an internet search using the exact wording in the advert and do a reverse image search of the puppy's image.

If you find matching images or text on multiple websites it could be a scam.



Round 4 of the grants program is now open and will add to the 124 proiects already making Adelaide cooler, greener and wilder.




