## Grants to bring your green vision to life -



UP to \$1.2 million is available in Green Adelaide's latest round of Grassroots Grants to fund community-led environmental projects across metropolitan South Australia.

Applications for round 5 of Green Adelaide's yearly Grassroots Grants program are now open to individuals, communities, clubs, religious groups and volunteers across Adelaide's 17 council areas.

Green Adelaide Presiding Member Chris Daniels, encourages members of the community to apply for funding to bring their green vision to life.

"We know that we all have a role to play in making Adelaide cooler, greener and wilder," Professor Daniels said.

"That is why these grants are not just for dedicated environmental groups, but they're also open to local sporting clubs looking to improve biodiversity by planting native species around their areas, businesses who want to build biodiversity in their street verges, community groups and not-for-profits who want to remove pest plants from their patch, or religious groups who want to bring more nature into their meeting places.

"I am excited to see how our Adelaide community can make the most of this funding and add on to 160 projects already funded through our Grassroots Grants," Professor Daniels said.

Individuals, communities, schools and volunteers can apply for a grant between \$2,000 and \$200,000 to help transform their local environments.

Professor Daniels added that the Grassroots Grants can be used to undertake a range of projects such as planting trees, installing a rain garden, managing weeds, improving habitat for wildlife and more.

"We are proud to provide practical funding for on-ground action for our environment."

"ART has been in my blood since birth and I have always worked in the art industry," said Bill McSwain, local Blackwood resident of some 40 years, who has set up an exhibition of some of his paintings in the shop next to Drakes Supermarket.

Bill left Australia in 1969 on a ship for London. He was there to study painting at the National Gallery, copying the Old Masters Drawing lessons and learning the finer points of ceramics.

He returned to Adelaide to put it all in to practice and ended up teaching at TAFE with painting, pottery and drawing classes for 30 years; while holding exhibitions in Melbourne, Sydney and Adelaide.

Locally, a number of years ago, Bill was commissioned by the Blackwood RSL to paint the stunning murals on the both the front and back walls of their building.

"Last year during the confines of Covid, I set out to discover the wonders of colour, shape, form, light and reflections. I used my knowledge of the past to guide me on my way and many of the paintings on display were created during my time stuck at home," explained Bill.

"I would describe my work as Modern impressionism, reflecting on the wonder of images seen on my past adventures."

All the paintings in Bill's exhibition are for sale, so if you are looking for something to decorate your walls at home, come along and have a browse through the extensive range of artworks on display.



# Shopping locally will help to keep dollars in our community

LOCAL retailers are asking the community to remember the importance of shopping local, as traders across the country call on the Reserve Bank to urgently cut interest rates, with inflation slowing and consumers struggling with the higher cost-of-living.

National Retail Association Director, Rob Godwin noted last month, a weakening in household consumption combined with high labour costs spell uncertainty for retailers who have had to keep up with business expenses by spending out-of-pocket. "If the Reserve Bank leaves cutting interest rates to 2025, we would risk losing current and potential investors into Australia, which means we will see a higher-than-usual number of retail businesses exit the market," he said.

"Retailers are reliant on the Reserve Bank to improve consumer spending and enhance investor sentiment so Australia's retail landscape can continue to grow," he said. "We need more than a hold on current rates, we need the Reserve Bank to consider the high cost-of-trading business owners have to face every day as a consequence of costly policy decisions."

While times are undoubtedly hard, some local retailers are increasing their trade with good old fashioned word of mouth.

Michelle McShane of Blackwood Lingerie said, last month on Saturday March 16 brought her highest ever day of trade. "I have been here 23 years and you take the good with the bad, and the main challenge over March is the impact of the Adelaide Fringe. Because the money people spend on shows, impacts on the money they have left to spend on other things," she said.

Her recent business growth is something she puts down to long term personalised service, and local residents sharing positive stories.

"For us, we are getting a lot of referrals from department stores. They don't give the service, so a lot of people are coming up the hill to get what they need and then they look around while here.

"I think this is the way forward. I know John Head in Blackwood Boot & Shoe Repair next door, has been getting a lot of sales from people coming in to get their boots repaired. These are the things people value."

Michelle said that she knows customers sharing stories has an impact. "Regular customers are coming back, and having a coffee or tea with a friend, telling them they've been to our shop and had a great experience; it's that kind of thing that makes a difference for a business like ours."

Michelle practices what she preaches, sharing the love for other local businesses whenever possible. "If I haven't got something someone is looking for, I will always refer them to another local business; be it Salt Culture, Kohl & Soda or Snazzi Boutique. We try to send shoppers on to other local businesses, particularly if they don't even know they are here, or are new to the area.

While Ricky Monserrat at Blackwood Dynotune is involved with the 'Blackwood Connections' business group, and said many retailers are seeing things on the slower side. "I try to buy local when I can, because I see how hard it is getting for many of them," he said.

Automotive servicing and repairs however, seems to be continuing a steady trade, in spite of cost of living and mortgage pressures impacting many people to reconsider what once were seen as essential services.

"It's one of those things, if people aren't buying new cars they are servicing their old ones," Ricky said. "All the workshops in Blackwood are fairly busy.

"Cars are changing and there are more electric vehicles and hybrids, but we see a lot of people restoring older cars and 4WDs with plans to keep them longer."

When you spend money locally, rather than travelling to a larger complex or shopping online, some of your money ends up back in our community. For many of our sports clubs and groups, they would simply not survive if it were not for the generosity of local small businesses, who make donations of goods and/or vouchers for fundraising events such as a 'quiz night' or 'fashion parade'. And where does this money for their donations come from - your shopping dollars!!

You may have children who are involved with a club or group, that without sponsorship from local businesses simply may not exist. And then, where do your kids go for an outlet away from the dreaded computer and social media!

So next time you are planning to shop outside of the Blackwood district, consider what your dollar can do within the local community. Chat to a local friendly retailer and get to know the people who help make Blackwood what it is.

## **Major makeover for Belair station**

THE Friends of the Belair Station do an incredible job of maintaining the station and in September last year we recognised their efforts.

As volunteers they are unwavering in their dedication to the station. They are there from the very early hours of the morning on a Friday and work hard with the help of their dog, Digger (maybe he is the reincarnation of 'Patch' the original station dog).

The Belair train station was first opened in 1883 and it differed from the other stations throughout the network due to its use of timber and its location on what was originally Government Farm.

Belair Railway Station is historically significant at a state level in its representation of part of a major development in South Australia's transportation history and a good example of a station built in the late 19th Century.

It is significant because of its association with the construction of the Adelaide - Nairne Railway in 1879-83 as well as the ambitious expansion of the network to build links to NSW and Victoria.

Fast forwarding to 1985, the signal box and station were entered into the register of State Heritage items. Sadly, in May 2003, the signal box was burned to the ground after 6 long years being lovingly restored by the Friends of Belair Station, including well-known local, Neil Stallard.

The signal box was rebuilt though, through the assistance of the then Deputy Prime Minister and Train Enthusiast, Tim Fischer along with former local Federal member at the time, Andrew Southcott.

The group were very pleased to find out that the State Government, in collaboration with Keolis Downer, have committed the necessary funds to restore the shelter. And a few weeks ago, I was able to let the Friends know that the works were finally going to commence. Since then, work has started and will include the following:

• new columns, hardwood plinths and

- strip footings new roof beam
- replacement of life-expired cladding
- new storm water infrastructure
- rebuilding of paving and edging
- rebuilding of bench seats
- · resurfacing of life-expired pavement under shelter; and
- repainting.

We are anticipating that the works will be completed pending weather in June.

I cannot thank the volunteers enough for their work and also their ongoing advocacy and I am so glad that we will all be able to enjoy the restored shelter very soon.

## Lack of integrity wastes taxpayer's money

> IT'S not too much to expect integrity from our governments. As citizens and as

taxpayers, we should be able to expect that our governments will act in the interests of the community and use taxpayer funding to get better outcomes for the community.

And yet, we only got a National Anti-Corruption Commission (NACC) legislated in 2022 after the Albanese Labor Government was elected.

Previously, I heard from so many Boothby residents how upset they were about the scandals and alleged rorts of the previous government: money wasted on car parks that would never be built, colour-coded spreadsheets used to allocate funding for electoral advantage against the advice of the relevant department, alleg-

ations of contracts going to mates of Ministers. Some people could list them off more than 30!

So I was very pleased to see the NACC announcement that it has now referred three matters for prosecution.

As politicians we are servants of the public. You may not like everything we do, but you should be able to trust that it is done without corruption and without self-interest.

## **Cats must remain on your property**

CATS are wonderful company and are well known for their curiosity and independence, but if they're not looked after properly, they can cause havoc to our native wildlife and a nuisance to other residents.

Mitcham Council have a duty to make sure everyone in our community feels safe, and that animal ownership doesn't create health or safety problems.

So they have introduced cat confinement for all new cats from 1 January 2024, to help Mitcham's cats live longer and healthier lives, while better protecting native wildlife.

All cats born or registered on or after 1 January 2024 will need to be confined to your property at all times. Cats can still go outside, as long as they remain on your property.

Try and encourage your cat to stay indoors, especially at night. Not only does this help protect local wildlife from your cat's claws and teeth, it protects your cat from potential harm, like getting run over or getting lost. Cat fights can lead to pricey vet visits and cats are also more likely to be run over at night.

Keeping your cat confined to your property is the safest place for you cat. They won't be at risk from getting lost, hit by a car or fighting with other cats.

Cats born or registered before 1 January 2024, do not have to be contained. However, it is important that your cat is not a causing a nuisance.

Easter treats can be harmful to your pets



WITH Easter just over, there is bound to be plenty of chocolate and Easter bunnies still in the house, and pet owners should be extra vigilant with what they feed their pets, as veterinary clinics gear up for one of their busiest times of the year.

While many families look forward to chocolate bunnies, Easter egg hunts and a tasty hot cross bun (or two), these treats can actually prove lethal to our furry friends.

"The humble hot cross bun is a favourite in households over Easter, but it's also a dangerous treat to feed your pet," said a 'Compare the Market' general insurance spokesperson. "The traditional versions contain dried grapes, which are extremely toxic to dogs. Even some of the more modern hot cross buns contain ingredients like chocolate, which is also a big no-no for animals.

"People may not realise that dogs can't break down a certain enzyme found in chocolate, which can cause an array of serious health complications like vomiting, a rapid heart rate, breathing difficulty, diarrhoea and more. It could prove life-threatening depending on how much your pet ingests."

Meanwhile, it's also important to be aware of other threats to your pets over the Easter period.

"Similarly, use Easter as a reminder to stay on top of your pet's vaccinations, particularly if you're travelling or if they're staying at a kennel over the holiday period. This can protect them against an array of common diseas-



WITH Easter just over, there is bound to be es, ranging from kennel cough syndrome and plenty of chocolate and Easter bunnies still dog parvovirus to hepatitis to cat flu.

- Tips for protecting your pet over Easter ...
- Be aware that your usual vet may not be open. Many vets may not be operating or may have skeleton staff working over the Easter long weekend. Knowing which 24/7 emergency clinics are located nearby, in case the worst happens, is a good idea.
- . Telehealth options may be available. An array of vet initiatives designed to keep their pets healthy and reduce veterinary expenses have been rolled out in recent times, including Dial A Vet, Webvet and more. These services allow you to pay a small fee for a video consultation with a certified vet. Keep in mind that if your pet is in life-threatening danger, you should always visit a vet in person.
- . Understand the limits and excesses that apply on pet insurance. If you need to claim on your pet insurance, do you know how much money will be reimbursed and how much you may need to pay? Be sure to read your PDS carefully, as you could still be left out-of-pocket – even with cover.
- 4. Ensure your pet's vaccinations are up to date. If you're leaving your pet at a kennel or a day care service, you'll need to ensure all its vaccinations are current. This not only protects your pet, but ensures they're able to stay. Kennels and day care services will usually refuse entry if your pet is behind on its vaccinations.

## Rotary's reach is far and wide

VISITORS to the School of Dentistry at the University of Papua New Guinea in Port Moresby are sometimes surprised to see, on the plaque near the entrance recording those who have assisted the dental school, the name of a small Rotary Club based nearly 3,000 kilometres away.

In fact, the local Rotary Club of Coromandel Valley has had a long history of helping with the provision of dental services in Papua New Guinea (PNG).

One of the first international projects undertaken by the Club related to the provision of dental services in the Solomon Islands.

That involvement had begun before the Club became involved with dental services in Papua New Guinea, however, the involvement with the Solomon Islands still continues.

Papua New Guinea became an independent country in September 1975. Some difficulties followed, and by 1997 there were only seven dentists left in PNG, which then had a population of some 7.5 million.

The Rotary Club of Coromandel Valley has assisted with the locating and collection of dental equipment no longer required in Adelaide, and the packing and despatch of that equipment to Papua New Guinea.

Upon arrival in PNG, that equipment had to be assembled and set up, and this required the services of a trained Medical Instrument Technician.

In 2004, the Club brought Bannah Essai (see photo) to Adelaide to be trained in the installation and maintenance of dental equipment.

While in Adelaide, he was billeted with a member of the Club.

Bannah underwent training at the SA Dental Service Technical Unit as a Medical Instrument Technician. The Club arranged for him to spend some time with the biomedical engineers at Flinders Hospital.

When he returned to PNG, he was able to set up and install the dental chairs that the Club had sent to PNG.

Three containers of equipment sent by the Club enabled the renovation of a 10 chair clinic with functional dental chairs, and this helped enable the resumption of the training of dentists in 2005. Other containers of equipment have enabled the establishment of other dental clinics in PNG, including one at the Kokoda Hospital.

In 2015, the Club brought another technician, Abbie Leba, to Adelaide for training after Bannah was transferred to work in Lae.

The Club continues to support the provision of dental services in Papua New Guinea.






