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

- Roundabout to go ahead despite minimal support -

COMMUNITY concern continues for upgrades to the Mitcham Hills Road Network (MHRN), as works to develop a roundabout at the intersection of Old Belair and James Road in Belair, looks set to commence in coming months.

The roundabout is slated as part of an overhaul of the road network, which will also see an upgrade of the Russell Street / Main Road / Sheoak Road "Belair Triangle" junction, along with the intersection of Shepherds Hill Road, Brighton Parade and Waite Street.

In response to community concern, Mitcham Council have formally requested works on the James Road roundabout be stalled until after the Belair Triangle works have been completed, so that subsequent impact of traffic flow onto Old Belair Road may be assessed.

Member for Boothby, Ms Nicolle Flint, who initially secured funding for the project, has also written to the State Government to request a delay to the roundabout work.

"It is imperative that, as elected representatives of our local communities, we undertake the necessary actions to address the concerns of residents," Flint wrote in correspondence to Mr Corey Wingard, Minister for Infrastructure and Transport.

A response from Mr Wingard suggested that the Department of Infrastructure & Transport (DIT) were satisfied with the current modelling, and would be continuing on schedule, with the roundabout to commence as the first part of the upgrade process.

Local resident and spokesperson for the Friends of Old Belair Road group, Greg O'Grady, said he was disappointed by the response, and ongoing lack of transparency from the DIT.

"We find it really disappointing that DIT seems hell bent on commencing construction works prior to the upcoming State Election, where we may well find that the Liberal Government fails to hold on to power.

"In the event that Labor forms Government, there has been a very clear commitment made to put this project on hold and conduct detailed analysis on the project validity... a position applauded by the Friends of Old Belair Rd and also supported by Sam Duluk MP, Mayor Heather Holmes Ross and the entire Mitcham Council Chamber, and even Nicolle Flint herself as the person that made the original \$20M election promise," explained Greg.

The designs are still in the process of gaining environmental approval, due to their encroachment into Randell Reserve and surrounding protected Grey Box woodland.

"These plans still involve substantial clearance of high value native vegetation within nationally threatened grey box grassy woodland. This is not clearance by chainsaw. It is clearance by massive earthmoving machinery and bulldozers. And once this landscape is cleared, it can never be returned," said Greg.

However, the works will also remove a sec-

tion of the Mitcham Hills trail network.

As a result of the trail connectivity being impacted by DIT's project, DIT have agreed to fund a new permanent trail section on Council land. A new trail link is feasible through the Green Ridge Track to Sugar Loaf Blue for walkers, runners and cyclists.

Mitcham Mayor, Dr Heather Holmes-Ross said Council would wait until all legislative approvals were passed, before reviewing whether to grant approval to undertake the replacement trail works to maintain trail connectivity in this area, both during and after the project construction.

"We don't support the decision, and have reaffirmed that we want a suspension of these works, but we also don't wish our community to be left without cycle paths," said Heather.

"So, we are allowing planning to go forward, however, when their applications are passed they will come back to council for a final decision. We can only advocate as it's a State Government decision."

Coro 185th birthday celebrations toned down thanks to Covid

ON 17th January 1837, the ship 'Coromandel' arrived at Glenelg, whereupon a number of sailors absconded and hid in the hills above the area now known as Coromandel Valley.

They stayed there until the ship sailed without them in March, then returned to Adelaide to face the music. The sailors were in luck, however, as the lack of an official to preside over their prosecution, meant they were not punished.

Roll the calendar forward to 1987; the Coromandel Valley community with the support of the SA Sesquicentenary (Jubilee 150) Committee and, the then City of Happy Valley, celebrated that act of desertion and discovery with a reenactment of the sailors fleeing to the hills.

The 33.4m ketch, *Falie*, took on the role of *HMS Coromandel* and it hove to in Holdfast Bay, with a motley group of "sailors" that were enlisted from local service clubs,

Council and the Coromandel Community Association members then took to the long boats, headed for shore and took off for the hills to endeavour to recreate the historical event.

The actual route the original absconders followed into the hills remains a topic of conjecture, but their destination up a prominent hill in Coromandel Valley is well documented. A commemorative plaque was installed there in 1987.

CoroAlive! 175 was a year-long program of over 70 celebratory events ranging from a Lions Sailor's Walk (the opening event on 15th January), to a Discovery Weekend, several "Spotlight on ..." sessions, concerts, a Ye Olde Picnic, exhibitions and displays. The organising committee was established under the auspices of the Coromandel Community Centre and included representatives of the Coromandel Valley Branch of the National Trust (CVDNT), local service clubs, churches, sports clubs, special interest groups, Onkaparinga & Mitcham Councils and interested residents (past and present).

However, thanks to the pandemic, celebrations were far more sedate and restricted than those of 2012.


Meanwhile, the CVDNT Branch is still actively recording and, when possible, sharing local history.

Best bushfire plan - leave the area early

FOLLOWING community consultation, a permanent bushfire egress gate will be installed in Star Lily Street, Craigburn Farm, adding an exit point to Cumming Street, without opening the access as a public road.

The new gate, along with an existing gate at Verdehlo Street, will remain closed but unlocked for residents to utilise, with road resurfacing of existing verges to be undertaken to allow better access for emergency vehicles.

The decision comes after a lengthy period of consultation, which saw the community express concern for both the potential risk to the community, and the impact opening the roads to traffic would have on the residents of the quiet cul-de-sacs.

Mitcham Mayor, Dr Heather Holmes-Ross hoped the outcome acknowledged both points of concern.

"The solution came from the community as a compromise position which allowed egress, but maintained the amenity of those streets which are 'no through' roads. I think it's a really sensible, well thought out solution, because everyone's concerns have been considered

"The gates will be unlocked, but able to be opened by anyone, and the hope is the residents will be vigilant in times of emergency," explained Heather.

However, she regrets that the process to reach a decision had taken so long. "It has been a source of anxiety for residents," she said, "and I wish a solution could have arrived more quickly."

Joel Taggart, Manager of Development Assessment Service at CFS South Australia noted that the CFS supports any additional

"Best practice land division design from a bushfire hazard planning perspective is to avoid the use of long no-through streets, such as Verdelho Street," said Taggart.

"The SA CFS supports the connection of both Verdelho and Star Lily Streets to the wider Blackwood road network. The proposed design appears suitable for firefighting appliance access, provided relevant car parking restrictions are enforced."

Howewver, though supportive of the added egress, Sturt CFS Group Officer Dale Thompson (see photo on right) and long time

Blackwood resident, warns that the development should not mean residents can become complacent about the risks of staying on fire danger days.

"We, as an organisation with the goal of fire suppression, really advise people not to be here at all. We would like to see people put their plans in place, and part of a bushfire plan, needs to be, to leave early on those bad days so that if a bushfire does occur, they are not in the area," said Dale.

"People tend to react late, when they see smoke and that is just too late. It's not when you want to be making decisions, you want to be gone.

"Anything about 'Severe' is a bad day, because that means that the fire will be weather controlled, not fire service controlled. So have your plan in place, and if you are going to stay, be prepared; if you're not going to stay, go early."

Dale acknowledged however, that not all residents would react with foresight, and said any additional egress is welcome, adding that an exit to the south of Craigburn Farm would assist in clearing traffic greatly.

"This option is looking at what is currently in place; but the issue is, that we know what Shepherds Hill Road is like on a bad day.

"If something goes wrong on that road, then people aren't going to get out, which is why we prefer to see people leave early. But unfortunately, not everyone will react with that foresight, so we need to look at what other options are available

"Going south is another option, but there is currently no exit from the Craigburn estate, so if people are pushing and trying to get out of the area, they are all heading towards Shepherds Hill Road through the main part of Blackwood.

"Whereas if there were an exit south, it could redirect some of the traffic through to Blacks Road and relieve some pressure that way," explained Dale.

Mayor Holmes-Ross said she would welcome a feasibility study into alternate exits. "I would be interested to look into a southern bypass. If you can prove that it would be useful, I think all options should be considered."

Improving safety on our risky roads

ALONG with the works commencing around Old Belair Road, the Department of Infrastructure & Transport (DIT) are looking at ways to improve the intersection of Shepherds Hill Road, Brighton Parade and Waite Street as part of their commitment to improve the Mitcham Hills Road Network.

A community survey undertaken in 2020 as part of a planning study identified safety as a key concern at this intersection, with a many residents also reporting 'near-misses'.

Other issues raised by the community included: the need for safe crossings and access for people walking and cycling; concern about traffic delays and travel times at the intersection; and the importance of access to local streets and businesses.

Initial community suggestions about how to improve this intersection included banning right turns, adding traffic signals or adding a roundabout. These options are now being considered, with DIT stating that installing a roundabout is the less preferred option, as while it would address some safety concerns, it would impact on private land, utility services, access and safety for people walking and cycling, and property and business access.

Local MP for Waite, Sam Duluk was grateful that the community's concerned were being addressed. "After many years of advocacy, I welcome the attention from both Federal and State Governments in our local road network," said Sam.

"There is so much happening, from the completion of the Shepherds Hill Road resurfacing, consultation being analysed for the Brighton Parade and Waite Street intersection upgrade as well as the start of community feedback for the Young Street and Waite Street intersection upgrade."

Former dump may be answer to parking issues

FACED with the choice between a 90-minute bus ride, a stressful drive down Old Belair Road to expensive parking, or a peaceful train ride; most local residents would choose the train as their commute to Adelaide's Central Business District (CBD)

However, as a student at the University of Adelaide and a Coromandel Valley local, I find that catching the train is my only viable and affordable means of transport to the city.

In fact, it appears that the state of public transport in the foothills is so dire that commuters from as far away as Upper Sturt, Flagstaff Hill and Aberfoyle Park find it easier to drive and park at Coromandel Station, rather than catching the bus into the CBD.

Due to limited options, there are regular shortages of carparks at both Blackwood and Coromandel Railway stations.

Train commuters driving to the Coromandel Station have had to resort to lining the surrounding streets with their parked cars, particularly on Brigalow Avenue and Johnson Parade, which often results in 'one-way' traffic in these streets during peak commute hours.

One long-term resident of Brigalow Avenue, described how her husband (a tradie) cannot fit his trailer into their driveway on busy week days. "Cars are parked into every space they can find, often cutting off access to the local resident's property," said Karen.

"A potential solution to the congestion of our residential streets could be 'permit-only' parking. This would help to clear the streets, but then where would these commuters leave their cars?" added Karen.

Before resorting to creative (and costly) carpark expansions, we must look to Mt Barker for inspiration which is significantly further away from Adelaide CBD than Coromandel Valley, yet many of its residents work in the city.

Mount Barker utilises "Park 'n' Ride" stations, introduced by Adelaide Metro for commuters to conveniently park their car before completing the rest of their journey on public transport, in an effort to save time, money and carbon emissions.

Locally, one option that is gaining momentum is a large parcel of vacant land near the train line at Eden Hills that could be transformed into a Park'n'Ride station.

This site which is the former Eden Hills dump covers a substantial area of flat land and is located behind the Blackwood Lions Bargain Centre on Shepherds Hill Road.

Sam Duluk, State Member for Waite, has recognised that the parking congestion at Coromandel Station causes "road congestion" and "safety issues for pedestrians".

The State government have designated \$99 million to restore and upgrade South Australian stations, and according to Duluk, the Minister for Infrastructure and Transport has confirmed that Mitcham and Belair are set to be included in this funding.

Duluk is supportive of a Park 'n' Ride station at the Eden Hills site to ease congestion, adding that the station could also attract walkers from the plains wanting to access the Mountbatten Reserve, and mountain bikers for the Craigburn Farm Trailhead.

A Park 'n' Ride station at Eden Hills could be a great solution to the lack of parking around Coromandel Station, giving local residents a more peaceful environment, but more importantly, potentially attract more locals to use the Belair train line.



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Full field entered for State election

WITH our State Elections fast approaching, voters in the seat of Waite will have an unprecedented amount of choice, with two independents standing alongside representatives for the Liberal, Labor and Greens parties.

Alongside newly independent MP for Waite Sam Duluk; Mitcham Mayor, Dr Heather Holmes-Ross has announced she will also be contesting the electorate as an independent, with the field being rounded out by Adelaide City councillor Alex Hyde taking Duluk's former position as Liberal candidate, Catherine Hutchesson representing Labor, and Brendan White standing for the Greens.

One local community group 'Voices for Boothby' have thrown their support behind independent candidates in both the upcoming State and Federal contests.

Spokesman John Denlay, said it was fantastic to have candidates speaking up for issues that matter to the community.

"During 2020 and 2021, Voices of Boothby has listened to the people of our electorate, through our 'kitchen table conversations' project, reaching out to a diverse range of voices in the community.

"We are excited that the community has a choice. Both at a state and federal level; we think it is fantastic that the community will have independents running who can use their position to represent them and not a party, which brings the conversation back to what people want rather than the negative politics which annoy people so much," said John. Denlay said that while party politicians had pull to get projects for the community when they want to secure votes, they ultimately serve the party, not the community.

"Things happen locally but it's often pork-barrelling, so is it what the community actually want? Is it where the real needs are? Is it consistent representation? Or is it centred on where they can buy votes?

"We heard loud and clear that the people of Waite/Boothby want greater action on climate change, a more gender and socially equitable society and greater transparency and integrity in our political representatives."

"It's great seeing independent women's voices in Parliament. There are women from a range of experiences standing up and saying they want to present a new form of politics, they want to do it differently," said John.

Meanwhile local independent MP Sam Duluk has released "Sam's Plan"; his platform for the upcoming term, foregrounding issues including the protection of natural and heritage space; bushfire mitigation and provision of equipment for emergency services; continuing the campaign to divert freight out of the foothills, improving the road and public transport network; and addressing general concerns such as cost of living, health and education.

"Our community needs a representative who understands the needs of our community and has a plan to make this area an even better place to live," said Sam.

"I have received a very positive response from the launch of 'Sam's Plan'. There is a lot of support for reactivating the

Blackwood Hospital site as a Health Precinct, changing the model for lowering petrol prices and my concept to plant one million trees with a 'Great State Tree Voucher'.

"I welcome you to visit my office or website to find my vision for Waite from 2022 and beyond."

Added independent candidates are not the only unique factor of the upcoming contest, with Covid restrictions having an impact on the rollout processes.

"The Greens have stopped all door knocking as we feel it's more responsible. Until we get more information from SA Health we won't be door-knocking anywhere in the state. We are instead looking at any opportunity to speak in forums and we will be leafleting," said Jane.

"The Electoral commission will decide if how-to-vote cards will be allowed to be handed out. We will continue to be guided by SA Health and the Electoral Commission.

"We will be putting up corflutes, but I want to stress that ours are fully recyclable."

Also Jane believes the added competition will lead to a close result. "It'll be a tight contest, there are some strong candidates running, and I think preferences will be crucial to determine the outcome." \Box

Be prepared, make a plan and stay informed

FIRE, fire, go away, come again no other day... Does this sound familiar? This bushfire season, remember to be prepared, make a plan and stay informed.

Here's what you can do to keep safe:

* Prepare now: clear around your property, pack an emergency kit and know your closest Bushfire Safer Place.

Plan ahead: do your 5-minute bushfire plan and share it with loved ones today, and plan for all your pets and livestock.

* Stay informed: check the fire danger rating each day and stay informed using more than one source of information in case a fire starts near you.

✓ PREPARE NOW

Did you know that nearly half of South Australians living in bushfire prone areas don't know the meaning of their local Bushfire Safer Place or where to find it?

This bushfire season, make sure you know the difference between your Bushfire Last Resort Refuge and Bushfire Safer Place. If you live in or near one, make sure you include this in your bushfire plan and know how to use it.

Emergencies do happen, anytime, anywhere. Make sure you pack an emergency kit with essential items and keep it in a handy place.

You also need to think about the physical and emotional effects a bushfire will have on you and your family. Preparing yourself to cope with a bushfire is as important as preparing your home and surroundings.

COVID 19 PROTECTION

✓ MAKE A PLAN

Would you remember a plan that's just in your head if you're surrounded by smoke, heat and flames?

Making a choice when a bushfire threatens is too late. Your safety and survival during a bushfire will depend on how prepared you are and the decisions you make, and a written bushfire plan will take the pressure off you and avoid arguments and delays.

The care and transport of pets and livestock before, during and after a fire is something that should be considered with bushfire safety. You can avoid heartache if you include pets and livestock when you develop your bushfire survival plan.

EMERGENCY KIT

Emergency kits should contain what you need to help survive a bushfire, what to take with you to safety, and what you may need for up to four days following a fire.

Pack your emergency kit before the fire season, so it's ready when you need it. Every household will require different items in their emergency kit and you won't know exactly what should be in yours, until you've written your Bushfire Survival Plan.

The best emergency kit is one that can be used for all hazards - not just bushfires. For example:

- Scan important documents and photos onto a USB stick/external drive.
- Buy a battery-operated radio, powerful torch and extra batteries.

- Save important contact numbers in your Ways to protect your home: phone. Include family, friends and the Information Hotline 1800 362 361. Have a spare mobile phone that you keep fully charged for emergencies.
- Set aside protective clothing (long sleeved, made from natural material such as cotton, sturdy footwear/leather boots and a P2 mask) for each member of the family.
- Put woollen blankets in your car in case you get caught on the road.
- Mark your main routes, including backup routes and petrol stations, on hard copy maps.
- Don't forget pets. Make sure your pet containers are with your emergency kit or packed in the car.

✓ PREPARE YOUR HOME

Keeping your home and property well prepared throughout the year is essential to ensure you survive a bushfire.

A well prepared home is more likely to survive a bushfire than one that hasn't been prepared.

A well prepared home:

- · Can be easier for you or firefighters to defend
- Is more likely to survive, even if you're not there
- Is less likely to put your neighbours' homes at risk
- Will give you more protection if a fire threatens suddenly and you cannot leave and have to take shelter

- Starve the fire by clearing vegetation and rubbish away from your home
- Create a defendable space by carefully managing trees close to your home and reducing vegetation for 20 metres
- · Fill the gaps where embers might enter or catch
- Protect your assets with adequate home and contents insurance

Even if you plan to leave early, there is a greater chance that your home will survive if you have undertaken preparations.

To protect your house, it is vital that you prevent sparks and burning material from entering through windows, under doors and/ or under floor boards.

You can do this by fitting metal fly wire mesh or solid screens to spark proof the windows, doors, ventilators and skylights.




Balance lives with positive thoughts

Register early for Clean Up Australia Day

AUSTRALIANS are urged to get in early and sign up for the country's largest community-based environmental event, Clean Up Australia Day (Sunday 6th March 2022), as the environment feels the effects of a post COVID-19 hangover.

The opening of volunteer registrations comes after lockdowns and changed habits fuelled a significant increase in household waste.

While Australians are returning to lifestyles of pre-pandemic normalcy, the last ping, meal delivery services and the use of disposable face masks and coffee cups, mean the environment is feeling the after-effects of the pandemic in ways not seen before," added Ms Kiernan.

Four in five Australian households made an online purchase in 2020 alone. Over 5.5 million Australians aged 14+ (26.5%) used meal delivery services last year and less than 4% of soft plastics are recycled in Australia, despite it being the most lethal consumer plastic for ocean

ful, long-lasting difference to the parks, beaches, rivers and pathways near us."

If you can't join a Clean Up, Ms Kiernan urges Aussies to make a donation to Clean Up Australia.
