New park zone protects vegetation and fauna

LAST month, the State Government announced they have adopted an amendment to the Belair National Park Management Plan, following community consultation undertaken earlier this year in relation to the former Belair National Park Golf Course Precinct.

The Belair National Park is South Australia's first national park, set aside for protection in 1891. The former Belair Golf Course & Country Club site in the Belair National Park has been a venue for golf, weddings and other events over many years.

In February 2021, the Department for Environment and Water sought the community's views on the future development of the precinct, through a master planning and draft amendment process. Following strong community feedback, a new Conservation 3 Zone has replaced the Golf Course/Caravan Park Zone.



This new zone will protect and enhance native vegetation communities and fauna habitats, manage a firebreak along the southern boundary, permit recreational activities that are inclusive and low impact to the environment. The caravan park and old clubhouse are included in the new zone.

Several key amendments have been made to the management plan, these include:

- * To encourage the shared use of trails, by promoting activities such as bushwalking, cycling and horse-riding
- * Prohibit high environmental impact recreational use within the zone, which includes not progressing forward with the proposed soccer club facilities
- * Recreational activities that will be permitted include disc golf, dog walking (restrained on a lead), festivals and community events, and bike flow and jump tracks.
- * Demolition of the former Belair Function Centre
- * Support of private sector interest in utilising

existing facilities, such as the old clubhouse, to deliver ecologically sustainable services to park visitors

- * Habitat restoration and revegetation of the former fairways to complement the existing vegetation
- * Recognise the continued operation of the caravan park, which may include future proposals to upgrade facilities using ecologically sustainable principles that safeguard the park's objectives
- * The zone will also be managed as a bushfire buffer zone as part of the Hills Face Zone Mount Lofty Ranges Fire Management Plan, in order to reduce bushfire risk.

Executive Director of National Parks and Wildlife Service, Mike Williams thanked community members and stakeholders for their input during the consultation.

"The consultation for this precinct provided a unique opportunity for community members and stakeholders to continue to help shape the site's future as part of Belair National Park. "The Belair precinct is an important site for the local community who made it clear they want to see the site protected and restored," said Mike

"This change in zoning will reinvigorate and reunite the precinct back into the broader Belair National Park, while offering new experiences to benefit all visitors.

"The new conservation zone will ensure visitors can continue to enjoy recreational activities that are inclusive and low impact to the environment."

As part of habitat restoration, work will also begin in coming weeks on returning the boundary areas back to their original landscape, with the removal of bunkers across the outer fairways at the former golf course precinct.

In the lead-up to the fire management season, these works will also make the ground flatter and easier to navigate in circumstances that require fire management.

Our local 'hero' just wants to give back

'WESTFIELD Local Heroes' is a recognition and awards program that celebrates people in Australia and New Zealand who make a positive impact to their local community or environment.

A total of 126 grants of \$10,000 each are presented to the successful heroes.

Pauline has also helped drive many of BAG's other projects.

For over a decade, BAG has been working to create a more aesthetic district hub, so it is a place where people enjoy catching up, as well as building community pride and belonging.

Pauline hopes the personal recognition of her efforts inspires others.

She believes community involvement and volunteering is richly rewarding and points out that many of our local community amenities and clubs are a legacy of earlier volunteer efforts.

"I am humbled to have been nominated, when there are so many active volunteers in our community who contribute in so many amazing ways," said Pauline.

"The work done by our history group and the volunteer team, that puts together the Christmas Tree Festival are fantastic examples of this. The award is an acknowledgement by the community of the great work done by BAG over many years."

BAG is yet to decide exactly how the \$10,000 grant will be spent, but a short list includes community events to raise money for the new Blackwood Community Hub ... perhaps "Blackwood's Got Talent" a series of family cabaret shows involving local performers.

BAG is grateful to Tracey Yeend for nominating Pauline, and for the community rallying to support Pauline and BAG through the voting process.

Tree removal fuels calls to delay worl

PLANS to construct a single lane roundabout at the intersection of Old Belair and James Roads have been met with concern from some in the community, prompting calls to delay progress until further details of the project's impact to traffic flow issues can be provided.

In the lead up to the 2019 Federal Election, the Australian Government committed \$20 million to upgrade the Old Belair Road and James Road T-junction and Old Belair Road (between Sheoak Road and Blythewood Road).

The Russell Street / Main Road / Sheoak Road junctions will also be upgraded as part of the South Australian Government's commitment to the Mitcham Hills corridor.

With community consultation completed earlier this year, calls for disclosure of results from community members have been met with silence from the Department of Infrastructure and Transport (DIT), prompting a petition to be launched by the group "Friends of Old Belair Road", requesting to suspend work on the planned roundabout until works at the Belair Triangle are completed.

The petition, which currently has around 750 signatures, also asks for the commission of an independent and transparent traffic study to determine whether any alterations are needed at all for the Old Belair Road and James Road intersection, once the works at the top of Old Belair Road are completed.

In response, Mitcham Council have formally moved to hold off on the roundabout works until such time that a traffic study can be delivered following initial works uphill.

"Cr Kruse brought the motion to council, citing concern in the community as to whether it was a sensible spend and a sensible solution," said Mayor, Dr Heather Holmes-Ross.

"It's been difficult to judge without any of the modelling from DIT, and without access to any of the public consultation.

"So it's been hard to work out a position, which is why we have asked for more details; we believe it hasn't been a transparent process."

Belair resident, Greg O'Grady, and the administrator of the Friends of Old Belair Road" group, has also been vocal about his concern for the potential for loss of natural environment to make way for the works, with the petition also calling for a commitment that no vegetation and habitat will be lost in Randall Reserve associated with any future road works.

At current estimate, the project will remove at least 288 trees over 1.5m tall (that locals counted within the DIT survey pegs) along with numerous native understory plants, that together comprise a remnant of nationally endangered Grey Box Grassy Woodland.

MP for Waite Sam Duluk, also noted his concern for environmental loss.

"The main issue raised with me by the community is the proposed loss of vegetation," said Sam.

"If the Department progresses with the current design, I have asked them to make changes to minimise the environmental impact and commit to replanting initiatives throughout the community."

Sam also echoed the request to delay the project until uphill works are completed.

"In terms of the timing of this project, many have asked for the commencement to be delayed until after the Belair Triangle upgrades have been completed.

"I would be disappointed if the State Government decides not to listen to this request and instead pushes ahead with the roundabout during the peak bushfire season."

Heather noted that there had been a strong response from the community both for and against the project, with residents wanting better traffic outcomes, as well as assurances the works would improve the situation with as little environmental impact as possible.

"There is no question as to whether something needs to be done to provide a traffic intervention at the intersection, it's a matter of finding the best solution," said Heather.

"With DIT silent on the matter, and the community saying that they're not convinced, I at time of print.

think the community have a right to understand DIT's point of view before they spend the money, and to see the results of the upgrade at the Belair Triangle."

The DIT were contacted but did not respond at time of print.

CCTV knocked back

AS reported in last month's *Blackwood Times*, local MP Sam Duluk wrote to the Minister for Infrastructure and Transport regarding the installation of CCTV cameras at the Blackwood roundabout.

This request came about as a result of numerous complaints from motorists using the roundabout, who have had an accident, only to see the offending party drive off.

If no details were able to be recorded, or no dash cam footage of the accident happening is able to be obtained, then your only recourse is to pay any out-of-pocket expenses.

However, the response from the Minister was not positive extracted from the Minister's letter:

"After receiving your correspondence, I asked the Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) for advice about this matter.

DIT advised it currently manages over one thousand traffic cameras on the road network to facilitate incident and traffic management. The traffic camera locations taken in ta

are selected due to their strategic location and quantity of traffic incidents

However, it is important to note that these traffic cameras are not installed for security surveillance or monitoring of intersections or pedestrian crossings.

Further, these traffic cameras are not installed to influence driving behaviour or record number plates for enforcement purposes, and footage is not released to insurance companies due to privacy laws.

I am advised a review conducted by DIT, did not highlight this location as a site requiring the need for traffic cameras at the current time.

Nonetheless, I am assured that DIT will continue to monitor traffic movements at this location, and should the need for change become apparent, appropriate action will be taken in the interests of road safety."

So it looks like that's the end of cameras overseeing the Blackwood roundabout for the foreseeable future!

Reforms impact council candidates

NOMINEES for positions on local councils will have to disclose political affiliations before the upcoming elections, following reforms implemented by the Local Government Association.

The reforms to the Electoral Act aim to create a 'level playing field' for disclosure of information. While existing council members are currently required to disclose information publicly, all candidates for election will now be required to disclose the same information during the election process.

The reforms will also highlight whether or not a candidate for election resides in the area of the council for which he or she is standing.

Former Mayor of Mitcham, Glenn Spear, who moved for the reforms to take place, was happy to see the changes put in place.

"I believe many people have chosen local government to pursue their own agenda. My principal concern is that when this happens, the administration and elected body are diverted from their core business," said Glenn.

While Mitcham Mayor, Dr Heather Holmes-Ross said that while she welcomed the decision, she did not want to see it bring party politics into the chamber.

"It seems pointless to hide your political ideology," said Heather. "I don't want local elections to become politically polarised. So if it is made a big deal of, and people are identifying as members of a party, that leaves

more scope for party politics to intrude, whereas currently I see it as a non issue. One of the inherent beauties of local government is that it is not party aligned, and I think it's possible drawing attention to people's political affiliations has the potential to damage that system."

However, Glenn considers it a matter of transparency. "The main point is, if people say it doesn't make any difference, then just disclose it. At the last state election, many of the Mayors around Adelaide ran for Xenophon's party, while still receiving their electoral allowance - one even took their ratepayer supplied car home.

"I think if you run for local government, then you should serve your four year term. If you then decide you want to pursue a political career that's great, but you should do it at a State or Federal level, resign your Council position, and let it be filled by people who have interest in local government affairs."

"In Mitcham, we have a councillor who doesn't even live in the local council area; I think council is meant to be about local people representing local issues. There has to be fair representation," added Glenn.

Heather said she did not see the reforms having an impact on council proceedings. "Party line doesn't cover local politics so I can't think of an issue where it would apply. Generally, the council issues are very much localised, so it is mainly political ideals rather than policy that come into play."

Solar program to accelerate renewable energy uptake

CITY of Mitcham's announcement seeking expressions of interest from prospective partners to work with Council to investigate, design, and deliver a community solar power model has been met with an enthusiastic response.

To date, 14 responses have been received ready to meet the proposed goal to provide solar panels with no upfront costs to ratepayers and provide access to cheaper power.

Mitcham Mayor, Dr Heather Holmes-Ross was ecstatic with the response, and said that council were now in the process of considering the finer details of the proposals.

"We are looking to enlist a panel of legal and renewable energy experts, who would be contracted to provide advice to Council on the suitability and viability of current and emerging renewable technologies, as well as the role council would play in the scheme.

The South Australian Government Chief Entrepreneur and SA Power Networks (SAPN) both provided their written support for the initiative.

Chief Entrepreneur for South Australia, Andrew Nunn, said the City of Mitcham initiative was a great example of how councils and other organisations, could break the mould to encourage widespread adoption of future technologies.

"By inviting collaboration with industry partners, the City of Mitcham is embarking on an innovative project to further accelerate the already strong rate in the uptake of renewable energy infrastructure in the region.

Heather said, "We are very excited that the project has been praised by Andrew Nunn, the South Australian Government's chief entrepreneur, and Prof. Monica Oliphant AO, solar pioneer and 2016 Senior Australian of the Year.

"Over the last two years, council has delivered many projects that build resilience in the local community and reduce greenhouse gas emissions

"Council has invested heavily in the installation of roof top solar on council owned buildings, which has not only dramatically reduced our reliance on power made from fossil fuels, but is also delivering savings through a reduction in electricity costs."

While solar uptake has been quite successful in the City of Mitcham, with solar panels installed on close to 40% of properties, council is interested in making solar accessible to all properties.

"The aim is that the community solar program will be developed to support our local business community by providing opportunities for indigenous businesses, innovative startups and local small businesses," she noted.

"Currently it is extremely difficult for tenants to access solar as there is little incentive for landlords to outlay for a purchase which won't save them money.

"However, by offering a solution which both removes the upfront cost and provides immediate access to cheaper power, both tenants and landlords are incentivised.

"With around 20% of Mitcham's houses either residential or commercial tenants, their transfer to solar could reduce the city's total emissions by 10%," added Heather.

In addition to encouraging a wider uptake of solar panels, the project envisages a pathway for community energy storage and management by increasing battery storage capacity and reducing reliance on the grid.

Dementia clinic aims to raise awareness and reduce stigma

"CONTRARY to what many people may think, dementia is not a normal part of ageing,' said Dr Stephanie Daly who has just opened a clinic in Blackwood called 'Sensus Cognition'.

Dementia affects people in their 50's as well as in their 80's and as the age range is wide, so needs to be the approach, but this all starts with reducing stigma and raising awareness.

"Blackwood seemed like the ideal location to set up this new venture, as the community is a real hub of activity and community spirit.

"This, as well as the development of the new community hub, highlighted how strong the community spirit is in this location. Blackwood also has one of the higher aged populations within Adelaide, so the need to support people in the community is even more paramount," explained Stephanie.

She is a passionate advocate for rais-

ing awareness of these issues and is hoping to reduce the stigma associated with Dementia by bringing a community based, GP led memory assessment clinic to Main Road.

The clinic will offer assessments for people who may have concerns about their memory or cognitive function, as well as offer support to those already living with a diagnosis of dementia and their families.

Providing more capacity to the system will offer people an alternative to the usual referral routes and follow up that can be ongoing for their particular needs.

With extensive experience from working in the United Kingdom in such a model of care, Stephanie hopes to extend this to the local community.

Stephanie will divide her time between her usual GP role, alongside being a medical educator for Dementia Training Australia, being an active member of the National Women's Council, conducting webinars and being the mum of two young boys.

Referrals can be made by people or their relatives, directly with the clinic. Collaborating with other healthcare providers is key with GPs of anyone using the clinic being their main contact.

Opening in November, Stephanie is excited to see how the delivery of care in a different approach can positively impact those concerned by, or living with a Dementia diagnosis.

Sensus Cognition, located at shop 6, 225 Main Road, is aiming to improve awareness, provide timely Memory Assessment within a community setting and ongoing support to people impacted by Dementia.

Wearing of masks by choir impacts on rehearsals

"IT WAS with a great deal of regret that the Hills Choral Society has had to cancel its October concert," said spokesperson and Hawthorndene resident, Bill Spraggs.

"The criteria to be adhered to, due to SA Government COVID constraints of having to wear masks for rehearsing and performing in a choir, made it impossible to hold the concert.

Christmas community events to celebrate festive season



FOLLOWING the turbulent events of 2020, and the tremendous kindness of our community giving to bushfire victims (human, animal and botanical) and supporting those affected by COVID, the Blackwood Action Group History Subcommittee's 2021 history articles celebrate the generosity of past residents and the legacy they have left for us to enjoy.

FROM the 1950s, an 'Annual Festival of Christmas Trees' was held at the Blackwood Memorial Hall.


It was organised by the Blackwood branch of the Country Women's Association, with Mrs W Fairbrother and Mrs F Jones heading up a hard-working committee. Proceeds went to the Adelaide Charity Fund which had been going for 50 years and supported underprivileged families and various Children's

The Blackwood Festival had numerous categories in which the community could enter exhibits, including hostess aprons in the 1960s, quite a fashion item at the time. There were over 250 exhibits catered for in 15 sections in the 1970s. Prizes for winners were awarded in each section courtesy of local businesses.

Each festival had special attractions, with Choir Boys from St Augustine's Church singing carols on the opening night of 1964. Renowned local artist Ainslie Roberts and his wife, Judy, designed and displayed nativity scenes on the stage many times. The festival featured a magic cave and in 1973 a model railway

Distinguished guests, such as Miss Telethon and Lady Playford, were invited to the Grand Openings of the Festivals. A Christmas Procession led to the Festival of Trees, featuring floats, bands, marching girls, fancy dress, vintage cars and decorated cycles.

In 1973-74, Mrs Coombes and Mary Eggleson assisted with the transition of running the festival to the Apex Club of Blackwood. At that time, the crowning of the Festival Queen and Runner-up was a highlight, with contestants raising money for the Adelaide Charity Fund and the Memorial Fund.

In 1976, new features included the introduction of a Children's Art Posters competition and food and drink stalls. While in 1978, Father Christmas was busy with 1,000 children

Then in 1979, the SA Mounted Police Greys led the Parade, followed by the Adelaide College of Music Drum and Bugle Band, City Bands from Mitcham, Glenelg and Marion, and Daws Road High School Band.

After the Blackwood Apex Club disbanded in the early 80s, Rhys Roberts, a well-known community leader and son of Ainslie Roberts, assembled The Hills Combined Community Clubs and ran the Blackwood Christmas Pageant for a few years.

However, the Lions Club of Blackwood took over the leadership of this task in the late 80s. The annual pageant is held (pre-Covid) on the first Friday in December supported by many businesses and community groups. It is very well attended and is the second oldest in South Australia behind the Adelaide Pageant.

Coromandel Rotary Club has conducted fairs after the Christmas Pageant each year, raising money for local and international projects.

Meanwhile, another annual event, the Blackwood Rotary Christmas Fair had begun in 1976, in mid-November, at Karinya Park, Eden Hills. A popular event with families in the leadup to Christmas, with over 40 stalls and many attractions. Takings often exceeded \$15,000 and enabled the purchase of a kidney machine, heating cupboard and mobile cot for the Blackwood Hospital and other significant community needs over the years.

The Blackwood Action Group (BAG), a relatively new community volunteers group, took over from the Blackwood Neighbourhood Watch the activity to adorn the streets with red bows for Christmas. In 2016, BAG'S Community Links Group reintroduced the Christmas Tree Festival with proceeds supporting the BEACON Emergency Relief Program and other

As we watch the emergence of a new community hub over 2022, we hope the community will take the opportunity to be involved in some way. We wish everyone good health and hap-


