## Learn to live by new fire danger rating system

LIVING in a bushfire risk area, like most of us do in the \* CATASTROPHIC Adelaide hills, means danger is on your doorstep.

In September, Australia's Fire Danger Rating System was improved and simplified, to make it easier for you to make decisions to stay safe on days of fire danger risk.

The move to a simpler system is backed by improvements in science, which will mean we can better predict areas of greater risk on days of fire danger.

The new Australian Fire Danger Rating System (AFDRS) (see image on right) is your simplified survival tool.

It's daily forecast tells you how dangerous a bushfire would be if it broke out, and what you need to do to stay safe on Moderate, High, Extreme and Catastrophic days.

Across the country there will be nationally consistent colours and terminology. This means that wherever you go in Australia, and whatever the season or fuels you're surrounded by, you can understand the level of threat and what you need to do to stay safe.

Community research found that most people were familiar with the old system, however, it just seemed too technical and irrelevant for them.

Here are the different Fire Danger Ratings: -

For your survival, leave bushfire risk areas. If a fire starts and takes hold, lives are likely to be lost. Homes are not built to withstand fires in these conditions. Protect your life by leaving early.

Do not travel into or through high-risk areas.

Lives and properties are likely to be lost if a fire starts.

#### \* Extreme

Take action now to protect your life and property.

Fires will spread quickly and be extremely dangerous. Do not wait for a fire to start - act now to protect people and

Monitor official sources for warnings.

Fires will move quickly and threaten your life.

Leaving before a fire threatens your community is the safest option for your survival.

Only stay if you and your home are prepared.

Consider whether you need to be in or travel through these

#### \* HIGH

Be ready to act. Fires can be dangerous. There's a heightened risk. Be alert for fires in your area. Decide what you will do if a fire starts.

If a fire starts, your life and property may be at risk.

The safest option is to avoid bushfire risk areas.

Plan and prepare. Most fires can be controlled. Stay up to date and be ready to act if there is a fire.

## 40km/h speed limit for Blackwood east

IN MARCH 2021, a traffic study was undertaken which supported the introduction of an area wide 40km/h speed limit in Blackwood east area adjacent the Belair Railway line, Belair Hotel, Main Road and Station Road.

The City of Mitcham is seeking feedback from the community on the proposed introduction of the speed limit.

The traffic study collected traffic speed data on 50km/h roads in Blackwood east and found that the average speed was 35km/h which supports the Minister for Transport's guidelines to introduce a proposed speed limit of 40km/h in Blackwood east.

Further, the introduction of a lower speed limit will reinforce existing vehicle behaviour on roads.

Mitcham Council are seeking your feedback on the proposed implementation of a 40km/h speed limit in Blackwood east including Station Road, Carr Street, Station Avenue, Colton Road, Stirling Road, Albert Place, Railway Terrace and Burfield Street.

## Do you know where this is?

IN 2022, the Blackwood Action Group (BAG) is taking a different approach with its monthly article, planning to encourage awareness of our local heritage. Under the title "Do you know where this is?"... each issue of The Blackwood Times will feature a

photograph of a local historic site. Readers are challenged to find its location, and thereby have a chance to win a prize.

The actual location will then be revealed in the following issue, and a brief description of the site and history.

THANKS to the people who entered last month's hidden sites competition ... the winners' names will be posted on the BAG website. Information about the location and history of the site that was published in the September 2022 edition follows ...

#### **Davies Thomas Reserve**

THE stone cairn is located near the Edgecumbe Parade entrance to the Davies Thomas Reserve in Blackwood. The two acre (0.67 hectares) reserve is bounded by Main Road, the railway line and Edgecumbe Parade on land which was donated to Mitcham Council in 1929 by Mrs Eleanor Davies Thomas, to be held for all time by the Council and not to be built upon.

Dr John Davies Thomas emigrated from the UK to South Australia in 1875. A highly-skilled and well-respected medico, he was appointed Senior House Surgeon at the Adelaide Hospital.



After their marriage, he and his wife Eleanor lived at 'Annandale', number 6 Edgecumbe Parade, opposite what is now the Davies Thomas Reserve.

Following his death in 1896, Eleanor funded the cost of the apse and vestry to be added to St John's Anglican Church in Coromandel Valley. She also established a perpetual endowment at the University of Adelaide to provide annual scholarships in the Faculty of Medicine.

In addition, in 1914 she sponsored the planting along Coromandel Parade of pine trees on the east side and elm trees on the west, donating £5 of just over £13 raised for the venture.

In recognition of her support, she was invited to plant the first tree, 'the filling in of the soil round this historic young elm being the signal for much applause'. Eleanor Davies Thomas died in 1934 in her 86th year.

The reserve was maintained by the Blackwood and District Tree Preservation and Gardening Society from 1950 to 1990 and rare species have been recorded.

Mrs Lilian Bradford provided the initiative for the formation of the group. Her name is recorded on the stone cairn. The work on the reserve was the group's first project, undertaken with the agreement and support of the Mitcham Council who provided the fencing and water connection.

The purpose was to make it into an attractive area – one that would serve a useful purpose as a reserve, and give pleasure to the people who visited it, through plantings of shrubs and trees.

On the Mitcham Council website, the Davies Thomas Reserve is listed as a Category 5 reserve which includes Woodland areas defined as:

- they often contain important remnant native vegetation
- they provide an opportunity for preserving unique flora and fauna
- they are in danger of becoming severely degraded by community use and the invasion of introduced species.

We continue to express our thanks for her generosity to Eleanor Davies Thomas, who, in the words of a Blackwood resident 'acted as fairy godmother to us all'.

## How to make savings on energy

AS I mentioned last month, most of our homes are badly designed for energy efficiency.

Heating and cooling comprise about 40% of our energy bills, so this is one area where we can make considerable

As we move into summer, the first thing to consider is to keep the sun from shining on our windows, as glass is a poor insulator. Hot sun on glass is like having a radiator on – which can be desirable in winter, but not so good in summer.

A regular check around the house over coming months will give you a good idea

of what parts of the walls and windows the sun is shining on.

Adding external shade with blinds, shutters and awnings can make a huge difference. These can be fixed, adjustable or removable depending on the situation. Pergolas can be added with deciduous vines to only let winter sun in.

These are easiest to do on north walls. East and west walls are more difficult as the sun is low in the sky. Consider quick growing plants here.

Double glazing also makes a difference. While expensive, it can be economical over time, especially for problem windows. There are also cheaper options using plastic sheeting in frames. Consider having temporary insulation panels to put up in very hot weather on some windows.

While external shading is the most important, closing curtains and blinds on hot days can reduce radiant heat build-up inside.

The next thing to consider is keeping the heat from penetrating into the house. Good insulation is critical, especially in roof spaces. Many older houses have no insulation and many newer houses have inadequate insulation. Adding additional ceiling insulation is cost effective.

Hot water is the next biggest consumer of energy. Wrapping hot water pipes with insulation outside and in ceiling spaces can reduce heat loss.

Washing clothes in cold water cleans just as effectively; and drying clothes in the sun and fresh air is better than a drier.

Consider installing solar hot water panels, and when the hot water service needs replacing consider a heat pump unit which is more energy efficient.

Sealing gaps around doors and windows can keep hot air outside.

Now is the time to prepare our homes and ourselves for summer, so we can be comfortable without spending too much on energy bills.

Good for our wallet as well as the environment.


And of course, there will be a visit by Father Christmas.

## Eftpos dilemma hurting small retailers

LOCAL businesses want to remind customers that cash is still a preferred method of payment for many small retailers, following a surge in card payment during the Covid pandemic.

Hidden fees associated with Eftpos facilities are often forgotten by shoppers, but for retailers, the associated costs add up.

"I don't think customers have a full understanding that businesses incur fees and charges on Eftpos transactions," said Kristle Rogers from *Country Meat* in the Drakes Shopping Centre.

"Depending on the bank, it can be anywhere up to 2.6%, so it takes a lot of money out of our pockets at the end of the day.

"Now everything is going back to normal, it's safe to carry cash, and we will still have cleanser available if customers wish to use it. But small businesses need cash to come back, so that if you're spending \$20 that is actually going to the business and not being eaten up in bank fees.

"Like many small businesses, we have had to impose a \$10 minimum for the convenience of shoppers using card payments, and we put on a 50cent surcharge if customers want to use it under that limit," explained Kristle.

"A lot of other businesses do it on a percentage, but we have found that unfair for those trying to do the right thing."

While another local small business owner, Michelle from *Blackwood Lingerie* in the Woolworths arcade, agrees that Eftpos fees have significant impacts on small businesses.

"Every transaction on card costs the business, whether it is for a \$2 product or a \$200 product. Some customers think that putting it on Eftpos doesn't cost the business, but it does,' said Michelle.

"In the first month of the pandemic, a whole day's profit went in paying the bank the fees associated with credit card and Eftpos transactions.

"As the pandemic went on, some months the fees added up to more than just 1 day's profit, which made it harder"

This impact is felt acutely by the small retail sector. "However, some businesses, such as restaurants, hardware and grocery stores can charge what they want on products," says Michelle.

"While most clothing stores such as

ours have a Recommended Retail Price (RRP) on their garments as they are delivered from the manufacturer, but if we added fees to the transaction, people will go and shop elsewhere.

"We do however, charge the fee once we have discounted a garment at end of season, but customers have a choice of paying the card fee or saving it and paying cash, as most times the discounted garments are already either at cost or below cost,' explained Michelle.

Michelle wanted to note that the complexity of the fees are crucial to businesses even though they are out of sight, out of mind when shoppers are buying an item.

"Most people aren't aware that some banks charge different fees for different cards, and sometimes extra fees to payWave.

"Even though an extra .02% or extra .05% on top of the usual fee may not sound a lot, it soon adds up and cuts into the money that we have to reinvest into our business to keep us here.

"As a small business we don't have the buying power to negotiate a better price from the supplier.

"Buy local or it could be bye local!" added Michelle.



## Planned earlier Sunday trading for all businesses not helping

A PROPOSAL to further deregulate Sunday trading hours has local traders questioning what it will mean for their business.

Under the State Government proposal, large retailers will be allowed to trade from 9am on Sunday as opposed to the current laws which only permit them to open at 11am.

Co-owner of Country Meats in the Drakes Shopping Centre, Kristle Rogers says the impetus for small businesses to stay open comes at a

"We don't really want to be open on a Sunday. We are a small business, and working 7 days a week means you don't get to have any kind of a life,' said Kristle.

"You should have the time to see your family and it's hard if you're unable to employ more staff. If people come to shop at our store and we aren't open, they will just turn to the big retailers, so it's a hard predica-

While not personally trading on Sundays, Michelle from *Blackwood Lingerie*, in the arcade next to Woolworths, fears the proposal would mean more dollars will drain from the local economy.

"I feel this will certainly impact on those small businesses that have always been able to trade Sunday morning before the major stores open.

"For major stores to now be open from 9am on Sundays, will take away from small business trade and as everyone knows, small business is the backbone of Australia,' added Michelle

## Free garden waste drop off at Lynton depot

PARTS of the City of Mitcham are within bushfire prone areas and residents must 'Prepare to Act and Survive' to avoid making last-minute decisions that could prove deadly during a bushfire. Thinking 'I will leave early' is not enough.

Bushfire prevention is a year-round responsibility and necessity. It is far more than a weekend clean-up just prior to the bushfire season.

The City of Mitcham website can help you to take actions to minimise the risk to you, your family and your property in the event of a bushfire.

It provides advice on preparing your property, who can give you assistance, and where you can get further information if you live in a bushfire prone area.

More importantly, it will help you to plan for a bushfire. Making an informed decision well in advance of a bushfire, as to whether you should stay in your house or go is perhaps the most important decision you and your family can make to protect yourselves.

So if you have a large amount of garden waste and need somewhere to dispose of it? The City of Mitcham has several options for residents looking to put their garden waste to good use.

- \* Recycle garden waste using your green organics bin (don't forget you can also include your food scraps)
- \* Set up a compost bin or worm farm
- \* Take your garden waste to the Lynton Green Organics Drop-off Facility which is located on Beagle Terrace in Lynton. The facility is open 9am to 3pm on the first, third, and fifth Saturday of each month (excluding public holidays) as well as on some Mondays throughout the bushfire season.

This service is only available for City of Mitcham residents who maintain their own properties. You'll be charged a fee for disposal, except on the free days indicated below:

October 10, 15, 24 & 29;

November 5, 14, 19 & 28;

December 3 & 12;

January 21 and February 18, 2023

The garden organic waste collected is transported to a commercial composting contractor and turned into mulch. On average, the depot receives over 600 tonnes of garden organics each year. This is a remarkable achievement for City of Mitcham residents.

## Help shape your local Council ...

THE 2022 Council elections are upon us this month, with the local area facing significant changes from the previous term.

Ward boundaries in the area have shifted, leaving some residents of Belair, traditionally falling within Park Ward, now finding themselves in the Boorman Ward, with a new perimeter running through Gloucester Avenue.

Changes in sitting representatives in the area are confirmed also, with Craigburn Ward Councillor Lindy Taueber, who has served the area for the past 8 years, announcing she will not be contesting.

This comes as the Craigburn Ward sees a reduction in sitting representatives from three to two.

Standing Park Ward Councillor Jane Bange,

who was elected in 2016, will now be contesting a seat in Overton Ward.

Incumbent Mayor Dr Heather Holmes-Ross will be challenged by her predecessor Glenn Spear, along with former television journalist Ray McGhee.

All voting in Local Government elections is by postal voting.

Ballot packs including reply-paid envelopes, will be mailed out between Friday 14 October and Thursday 20 October 2022.

Completed voting material must be returned by 5pm on Thursday 10 November 2022.

The scrutiny and count will take place at City of Mitcham Civic Centre, 131 Belair Road, Torrens Park from 9am on Saturday 12 November 2022.





## Grass seeds pose a risk for pets

AFTER a long, cold and wet winter, it's no surprise that our furry friends are bursting with excitement about getting out and about again in the great outdoors.

While the warmer weather is a welcome sight for our dogs, there may be a nasty surprise waiting for them at the local park or walking trail.

Grass seeds, or grass lawns, can cause all sorts of problems in our dogs. They typically



measure 1-2cm in length and not only can they be very sharp, they also have microscopic barbs which make them very good at attaching to our dog's coats.

Grass seeds can be found in many areas but are more prevalent in areas with very long and more importantly, dry grass. Grass seed 'season' typically spans through spring and summer.

Grass seeds can pose a risk to our pets for a variety of reasons. Because they are so sharp, they have the potential to burrow deep into the skin and track long distances. While we mostly find grass seeds in places like paws, ears, noses and eyes, they can sometimes travel into hard to find places and cause serious issues.

The signs of a grass seed in your pet will vary depending on where it is locat-

A grass seed in the eye may cause acute soreness and squinting. While a grass seed in the ear will often cause a sudden onset of head shaking and discomfort. A grass seed in the nose will usually cause acute and continuous sneezing.

Perhaps most commonly, grass seeds can be found in between the toes where they get caught in the coat and then penetrate the skin.

In these cases, your pet may limp and incessantly chew/lick their feet and there may be redness and swelling present. In more serious cases, grass seeds may enter into the chest or abdominal cavity where they can cause serious infections.

If you suspect that your pet may have a grass seed that is stuck, contact your veterinarian.

In many cases, sedation is required in order to remove the grass seed especially if it has penetrated deeply into a foot, or is in a hard to reach place like an ear canal or a nostril! Some cases may even require an anaesthetic and specialist imaging to be able to locate the position of the

ruptured ear drums, corneal ulcers (if in the eye) or nasty infections. Prevention of grass seeds is therefore crucial.

So, how can you help? Firstly, avoidance is key. If possible, avoid long, dry grassy areas

Secondly, it is very important (particularly in long or thick coated animals) to thoroughly inspect the coat and feet after walks and remove any grass seeds that may have become attached - this will prevent them from penetrating the





Due to construction of the the Blackwood Community Hub & Library taking place on Waite Reserve, the Christmas Fair normally held after the Pageant will need to be relocated and the committee are working hard on a solution for the children to see the 'old gent' and get their bag of lollies ... more information on that to come.

With around 13,000 onlookers turning out in previous years and 850 Pageant participants, the Christmas Parade, involves a lot of organising and help from members of different service clubs and organisations.

THE Lions Club of Blackwood, along with the whole community is still finding itself managing the ongoing effects of this long running Covid pandemic. It seems to catch up in many and varied ways, from Club members being ill and unavailable to undertake their normal Lions Bargain Centre tasks, to the every day things like, whether to wear a mask or not.

As was reported in last year's report, the Club reached the milestone of \$3M raised through their Bargain Centre on Shepherds Hill Road, Eden Hills (next to soccer pitch).

"I am pleased to report that we are currently trading at a feverish pace," said Chris Martin, Blackwood Lions Club spokesperson, "and the Centre is reaching record sales, which of course is only achievable because of the generous donations of saleable items from the Adelaide Hills community."

Plans are in progress to expand the storage area at the Bargain Centre and the Club is assured of support from a Federal Government Grant, combined with assistance from Mitcham Council to achieve this. There will be a few hoops to negotiate before work can start, but they are hopeful that this will be sooner rather than later.

The Club has continued to support some 40 odd recipients again this year and they have appointed a Club member to liaise with local Primary Schools having pledged an amount of \$2,000 to each school to assist with a project of their choice.

Similarly, they have committed \$1,000 and a liaison person to each Scout Group. These amounts will be an ongoing project of the Club, and believes the donations will be of assistance to the younger members of the local community.

The membership of the Lions Club have again been able to contribute some 10,800 volunteer hours over the past twelve months; the dollar value of those hours to the community is estimated to be in excess of \$35,000.

"The Lions Club of Blackwood and its major fundraising venture, the Bargain Centre, can only continue to provide assistance to the community with the assistance of volunteers," explained Chris. "If you feel that you have some spare time and would like to give something back to our local community, feel free to catch up with us at the Bargain Centre on a Saturday morning and have a chat about helping out. You never know, you may enjoy it so much that you want to join Lions."

The Club is constantly seeking feedback as to what the local community needs. This year we have been involved with assistance to some of the displaced folk from the Ukraine in that we were able to provide an amount of furniture, and general household goods, to assist with setting up accommodation for some of these unfortunate folk. Disaster relief has been a major recipient of funding from the Club this year, with approx. \$15,000 being donated towards flood relief, the majority of those funds have been focussed within Australia.

## Emotional health is important as physical health



"UNFORTUNATELY, there is stigma and shame attached to having emotional and mental health issues," said Carol Buchanan, (photo above) an Emotional Trauma Therapist.

Carol has resided in Coromandel Valley for over 10 years and always wanted to live in a

"I enjoy shopping locally and supporting our small businesses; while also keeping active with pilates classes at the Coromandel Community Centre and attending Premium Fitness in Blackwood," said Carol.

"Emotional health is as important as physical health, in fact they are impossible to separate.

"If you have a physical injury or health issue there are always worries, fears and emotions attached. Such as worrying if you are ever going to get better, or stop you from doing your usual activities.

"Pain can drain your energy and make you feel miserable, leading to issues with sleep and

"And if you have an emotional wound, it can affect you physically. Sometimes you feel exhausted, have a racing heart, a heavy feeling

in your chest, back pain or tense jaw, headaches, etc." said Carol.

Carol's background as a nurse led her on a journey to help people heal their emotional pain, which also improved their physical health, such as chronic pain and IBS.

This is when Moveon Counselling was born. As the name suggests, Carol recognised that people do actually want to move on!

She wants to demystify mental health so you can know that you are not alone; everyone struggles at some point in their life, it's a normal reaction to stress and distressing circumstances.

"If we can start to think in terms of what has happened to a person, instead of what's wrong with that person, we can start to remove stigma and find a more compassionate approach to people who are struggling with mental health

"Most people don't feel shame for having broken a bone, do they? Emotional wounds are like physical wounds, they need care and attention to heal. If you have been in a distressing situation your body remembers it!

"That's what triggers are. If you are reminded of a distressing situation or memory, you may feel emotional, anxious, scared or overwhelmed. PTSD is a classic example of how the body and mind remembers and replays these distressing events like a stuck record. These emotions and triggered memories are not within your conscious control," explained Carol.

"Often, it's not just one thing that has led to emotional issues, but an accumulation of difficult life experiences, leading to feelings of low self-worth, depression, and anxiety. Some people may develop compulsive behaviours like addiction and obsessive thoughts or rituals as a way of coping with distressing feelings. This tends to happen when you haven't processed stressful times.

"Pushing down your feelings doesn't help in the long term. You may believe you are being stoic or brave, but not addressing your pain can lead to anger outbursts, overreacting or feelings of resentment and anxiety or depression.

"It may also make you hard to live with. It's crucial that you don't feel you are burdening

anyone if you open up. It is better to express your emotions before they erupt like a volcano!"

Carol's uses neuro-dynamic approaches that are holistic, involving your senses and imagination to address and heal the root of the issue, so you can leave the past behind.

She has a clinic in Blackwood and sees people at home or on-line. Remember that your mind has the capacity to heal from your past!

Between 2002 and 2020, Greenland shed an average of 279 billion metric tons of ice per year.


Recent reports, emanating from scientists, are now warning that in the future, Greenland ice sheets will melt at an even faster rate than now.



AUSSIES currently throw out one in five bags of groceries (\$2,000 to \$2,500 per household) every year.

Food scraps in the bin to landfill create methane – a toxic gas 20 times worse than the emissions from our cars.

Keeping food scraps from the bin and getting them back into the soil makes for healthy soils to grow more produce. Healthy soil also draws more carbon out of the atmosphere.

Here's what you can do to reduce food waste:

- No garden? Live in an apartment? Google to find out your local council options for organic waste.

Give your scraps to neighbours, friends or family who can get those nutrients back into the soil where they belong.

Do everything you can to keep food scraps from the bin and get that stuff back into the soil.


