MITCHAM Council have agreed to take part in a trial program of Electric Vehicle (EV) Chargers on Stobie Poles initiated by SA Power Networks (SAPN).

With ongoing roll-out of EV infrastructure throughout the country, SAPN has been searching for a partnership, in assessing whether there is a future in widespread installation of EV chargers at select stobie poll locations.

The initiative is in the early stages of concept, with the trial set to consider the scope, governance and particulars of the project, such as possible locations for chargers, who will own the charging assets post installation, designating responsibility for ongoing maintenance, along with billing and revenue from the assets.

SAPN have confirmed that they will cover all costs associated with deploying the charging infrastructure. In return, they are seeking Mitcham Council support to select appropriate locations and undertake community engagement associated with the trial.

As such, there will be no impact to ratepayers at this stage, with Council only agreeing to the initial terms of the trial commencement.

Council administration noted that the trial is attractive, considering that the role of Local Government in EV charging is uncertain, and that participation would ensure that if this kind of initiative is rolled out at scale across the State, the interests of Local Government would be adequately represented, with the additional potential for Council to realise revenue from this initiative that is not generated from Council rates; an attractive proposition in the context of the current cost of living crisis

The trial will initially consider the potential location of approximately 5-10 chargers; community impact, and ownership and operating models.

Once the agreed upon chargers are deployed, monitoring and data collection on their impact and performance will be undertaken for approximately 12 months, which will include a consultation of the sentiments and experience from members of the community.

Following the trial a report will be published on its findings.

The trial will follow the recent installation of EV Chargers at the new Tiwu Kumangka Blackwood Community Hub & Library site as part of the RAA EV Charging network.

Dangerous intersection on upgrade list

FOR many years, Blackwood motorists have raised concerns around the difficulties of turning right from Waite Street onto busy Shepherds Hill Road (SHR).

However, the long wait for a solution may be close to coming to an end, with site investigations, including geotechnical and service investigations, being undertaken throughout the year to identify the best treatment for this dangerous intersection.

While some drivers may run the gauntlet from the stop sign at Waite Street across the busy main arterial road, many find it a matter of necessity to take a left, using the Blackwood roundabout to eventually head down the hill, which is an option not without its own issues. Similar challenges face those motorists wishing to turn right into Shepherds Hill Road from Brighton Parade.

The Shepherds Hill Rd/Brighton Pde/Waite St intersection was identified as a priority in the Road Management Plan undertaken for Main Road and Shepherds Hill Road in 2015.

There were 25 crashes at the intersection over a five-year period (2014-2018) including

13 casualty crashes. Right turn movements onto Shepherds Hill Road and straight through movements from Waite Street and Brighton Parade contributed to the majority of these crashes.

A community survey undertaken in 2020 as part of the planning study, identified safety as a key community concern at this intersection, with a number of local residents also reporting 'near-misses'.

Other issues raised by the community include the need for safe crossings and access for people walking and cycling; concern about traffic delays and travel times at the intersection; and the importance of access to local streets and businesses.

Initial community suggestions about how to improve this intersection included banning right turns, adding traffic signals or adding a roundabout.

Three key intersection upgrade options were investigated at this location:

The first option would prevent right turn and straight through movements from both Brighton Parade and Waite Street. These movements currently make up only 2.4% of the total

movements at the junction, but contribute to the majority of crashes at the intersection.

While this option would improve safety with minimal disruption, with the proposed treatment also providing an additional pedestrian median strip refuge, it would also require right turn and through traffic from Waite Street and Brighton Parade (typically 580 vehicles per day between 7am and 7pm) to choose alternative routes, most likely via Woodleigh Road, Gladstone Road, Main Road and Melton Road.

A second treatment option would involve the installation of traffic signals and extension of the right turn lane on Shepherds Hill Road from the western approach.

Brighton Parade would have a dedicated right turn lane as well as a shared through and left turn lane. Signalised pedestrian crossings would be provided on all four approaches to the intersection, and bike lanes would be installed on Shepherds Hill Road.

Several respondents to the 2020 community survey suggested relocating the existing signalised pedestrian actuated crossing on Shepherds Hill Road to reduce congestion caused by its proximity to the roundabout and service station.

This was considered as part of Option 2, but pedestrians would still likely cross at the existing location, creating safety concerns. Instead, coordinating the timing of the two sets of traffic lights has been identified as a preferred option.

The third upgrade on the table was the possibility of installing an additional roundabout at the intersection. This is not considered a preferred option, due to increased impacts to both utility services and property on each corner of the intersection; together with increased difficulties getting in and out of Waite Street during peak periods, due to the close proximity to Blackwood roundabout, and queuing on Shepherds Hill Road.

Local MP for Waite, Catherine Hutchesson was contacted for comments but had no further updates at time of print as to a start date or decision on the desired option.

With works continuing throughout the Mitcham Hills Road Network, there is hope that a suitable solution will be implemented to address the issue sooner, rather than later, to accommodate the ever increasing usage along this major road corridor.

1950s 'snapshot' of life in the Mitcham Hills

major contributor to the family food supply.

Every inch of the standard quarter acre block had a role to play. The back yard was the focus of the food industry: rain water tank, incinerator, garden shed home of Australia's own Victa lawn mower and other essential tools, wood shed, rotary hoist, hardy buffalo grass lawn for children to play on, possibly septic tank, chook shed and run, compost heap, vegetable beds

The front yard was more focused on the aesthetic, with a less hardy lawn surrounded by flowerbeds and shady trees, and perhaps some garden furniture for hosting afternoon tea. Adjacent to the house was the drive and garage for the car with associated tools, bikes and general household debris.

The Coromandel newspaper in the 1950s provided several sources of information to support the home gardener. An important item was the rainfall record which was significant for

One of the objectives of the local Tree Preservation and Gardening Society was 'to foster wise use of trees and shrubs in gardens, parks and streets'. (21 Jan 1955)

Topics explored by the society in their monthly meetings in 1955 included mulching saves water, garden design and bushfire awareness. 'The Gardening Subcommittee will advise on garden layouts for homes, parks, reserves, also on the propagation and

GARDENING in the 1950s was not only a hobby but also a planting of plants in general'. (18 February) 'Ashbys provided an item of extra interest with a bowl of mixed native flowering shrubs. Miss Alison Ashby answered members' questions concerning these shrubs.' (4 March)

> From 1954 onwards, the regular articles by 'Crataegus' (Does anyone know who Crataegus was - perhaps a resident of Hawthorndene?) provided a practical guide on what to plant and when to plant throughout the year. An example of the detailed advice is found in the article 'Prepare for bulbs' (4 Feb 1955):

> 'Before they are planted, make sure the soil is well prepared... Now nerines, autumn crocus, next daffodils, hyacinths, tulips, all other small and large bulbs.

> Guide - Seeds: Antirrhinums, cinerarias, Iceland poppies, pansies, sweet peas. Plant out - Trees: shrubs, hedge plants; Vegetables: lettuce, silver and red beet, tomatoes, radishes, carrots, parsnips, cabbages, French beans'

> Some of the articles by the indefatigable Crataegus were 'Prepare for winter annuals' 4 March; 'Hurry with bulbs' 11 March; 'Geraniums look well in pots and Cinerarias make good show' 1 April; and 'Prepare for summer annuals' 7 October.

> The highlight of the year, particularly the gardeners, was the Floral Fair held on the long weekend in October.

> 'Three days til the Floral Fair' was the headline of the 7 October 1955 issue of The Coromandel. 'The Tree Preservation and Gardening Society will have a float in the procession, and



with added interest being taken in the floral competition, this should be a real Floral Fair'.

Need more information before voting in the 'Voice' referendum

IT HAS been a busy month of conversations and deeper learning about the context of the Referendum, and the dilemmas it is presenting to many people.

Here is something new I have learned: Isn't the Voice dividing us by Race? Isn't that illegal?

Racial discrimination is illegal. Australia is a founding member of the United Nations and bound by its Conventions. Australia has enshrined the principles of the Convention on the Elimination of all forms of Racial Discrimination in law.

However, I also learned this month of the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP).

Dr Rowan Nicholson, an expert on International and Constitutional Law, explained at Flinders University that Indigeneity is an important international legal concept.

It defines people who have become a minority in their own, original country through a process of Colonisation. Indigenous people, such as Aboriginal and Torres Strait islander people here, the Maori in New Zealand, the Sami in Norway, the Native Americans in USA, all have unique needs that are recognised internationally through this Declaration. Australia endorsed this Declaration in 2009.

How are Indigenous rights different from human rights for everyone?

Everyone is entitled to the full realisation and protection of human rights as set out in international human rights treaties. This applies to Indigenous peoples and non-Indigenous people alike.

While this may sound simple, ensuring that people are treated equally has proven a challenge the world over.

Indigenous rights are not additional or special rights for Indigenous peoples. Instead, they show what factors should be recognised so that universal human rights standards can be fully realised for Indigenous peoples.

As an example, UNDRIP sets out the importance of recognising Indigenous cultures and languages so that Indigenous peoples can equally enjoy the right to education. There are similar Human Rights declarations for other unique groups such as children, women, people with disabilities, and people vulnerable to racial discrimination.

The right to self-determination, to participate in decisions that affect them, and the right to decide how they develop politically, economically, and socially, are just some of the rights UNDRIP grants.

The Voice will be a major contribution for these rights to be experienced by our First Nations people. Dr Nicholson will be on a Panel providing answers to questions about the Voice at Blackwood Uniting Church on Saturday, September 23.

Climbing Ben Nevis to celebrate 80th birthday

ON the day of his 50th birthday, John Cullen, a Belair resident, returned to Scotland, where he was born, to climb the highest mountain in the United Kingdom, Ben Nevis.

That was 30 years ago, and John declared that if he was still alive when he turned 80, he would do it again!

"This was something he talked about often," said Paula Griffiths, an Eden Hills resident and John's daughter, "so his grand-daughters made pledges that they would go with him and climb the mountain when he turned 80. As the time got closer to his 80th, plans were made to fly to Scotland."

John didn't do much preparation for the climb when he was 50 but at 80, he needed to get himself in to good shape.

John started to walk to appointments around Blackwood, and do things like catch the train into the city and walk back. He would also walk from Belair to Crafers and back again, along Sheoak Road; and often go for a walk through Belair National Park and tackled Mt Lofty on many occasions.

"Then on Tuesday 18 July, two days before he turned 80, John climbed Ben Nevis with three of his five grand-daughters. When he was 50, it took him 7.6 hours up and down," explained Paula. "And on his 80th, it took him a gruelling 14 hours up and down.

"However, everyone on the mountain that day were so impressed with his resilience and determination, and to be able to do it at 80, when many younger people struggled to do the climb. We are so incredibly proud of him," said Paula.

John who is a resident at Kalyra Retirement Village, still keeps very active walking and he loves to visit residents on the village that are not able to get out their homes.

If you don't know, then get informed on Voice referendum

FOR many years I worked in the health sector. My

background is in public health, and I ran a large number of community based health services, across Adelaide and across South Australia.

You may know of some of them -Breastscreen SA, the Day Rehabilitation Service at Hampstead Rehabilitation Centre, Migrant Health Service, Parks Community Health Service.

My commitment was always to ensuring that the needs of those with the worst health outcomes, those in most need and those who had the most difficulty in accessing health services, were front and centre in any planning or service provision.

If you can get the service right for those people, then it works for everyone.

One of the basic concepts to get the services and programs right is "Nothing about me, without me".

It's a fairly obvious concept - you wouldn't design a program for older citizens without talking to them and finding out what works for them. You wouldn't design a program for younger people, or for men, or women - or any population group - without asking what is going to work for them.

I can design a "best practice" health program, but if it doesn't work for the target audience, it is a waste of time and money. Basically, consultation leads to better outcomes.

There is one group in Australia that despite considerable effort - targets, programs, and funding - continues to have significantly worse outcomes than the rest of the community.

Aboriginal people have a shorter life expectancy, higher infant mortality, worse educational outcomes, worse social and employment outcomes. Of the 19 Closing the Gap Targets, only four are on track. Some of the measures have actually gone backwards.

The upcoming Voice referendum is a once in a generation opportunity to make a difference for Aboriginal people and for Australia.

There is a lot of misinformation circulating about the Voice referendum and what it does

Ultimately, the Voice as requested in the Uluru Statement from the Heart, and as recommended by the two committees that looked at the Voice under the former LNP government, is an advisory body. It will provide advice to parliament and executive government on what they believe will work. It will aim to have better outcomes as a result of this consultation.

It will not run programs, it will not provide funding, it will not have a veto, it will not be a third chamber of government. Parliament will still be the only entity with the power to make

If you don't know, then get informed.

Voting is an important right and privilege our democracy is built on people exercising their collective and informed will through voting.

This is an important opportunity in the life of this country.

What '60 day prescriptions' will mean for many community pharmacies

IN response to the column 'Savings to be made with prescription renewals' published in last month's Blackwood Times for Boothby Federal MP, Louise Miller-Frost, one local pharmacist has provided his view on the planned program.

Simon Dawe, a Green Dispensary partner, wrote

Consider this ... the Prime Minister and Health Minister walk into the Belair Hotel and declare they will buy everyone in the hotel two drinks. They pay for the first drink but then walk out leaving the hotel to pay for the second drink.

The hotel then has to work out how it makes up for the loss that the politicians have just caused to the business, whilst the politicians tell everyone how much money they just saved all the custom-

This is what is happening to pharmacies with the introduction of 60 Day Prescriptions.

The Labor government tells us 6 million Australians will be better off with 60 Day Prescriptions; what they don't say is 2 million of these people actually reach their PBS Safety Net and will not actually save any money.

These are the people and families who are on 6 or more medicines a month. They will still spend the same amount of money to reach their PBS Safety Net, this will just take longer. These are often the people that rely on their pharmacy for webster paks and home deliveries.

The Labor government keeps saying they will reinvest the \$1.6 billion they are saving, back into community pharmacies, but they are not being bonest

They are using this money to either pay for existing services that pharmacies already deliver such as Home Medication Reviews, or they are using that money to fix other problems. How does \$10 million given to the TGA so big pharma companies can list their medicines on the PBS or \$111.8 million to fund electronic prescriptions help a pharmacy in Blackwood.

A report from the Commonwealth Bank shows that pharmacies will potentially charge for services such as blood pressure monitoring, webster paks for aged care and home deliveries. These were often previously free services. Around half the pharmacies are also considering reducing opening hours.

This should not be a surprise to the Labor government as their own report stated that on average, each pharmacy stands to lose \$158,000 in income.

This may not seem like much money when you think of a Chemist Warehouse, but to most community pharmacies, this will severely impact their ability to repay their loans, employ people, and provide health care to their communities.

Pharmacists are not opposed to 60 Day Prescriptions. We just want to work with the Federal Government so that it is introduced without damaging patient services, and threatening the viability of community pharmacies.

War on waste, what is real answer?

LIKE many people, I watched Craig Reucassel's latest TV series of *The War on Waste*. If you missed it, catch up on ABC I-View.

As with previous ser-

ies, he presented a mix of worrying statistics, sad lack of action, as well as some positive initiatives

initiatives.

Each of us on average gets rid of 3 tonnes of stuff to landfill per year in Australia, including 100 kilograms of plastic and 10 kilograms of clothes

Three-quarters of clothing purchased is thrown away within a year.

There will always be stuff that breaks or wears out, that needs to go to landfill.

Most of what we get rid of however, can have a further useful life being re-purposed or recycled. Over 70% of what we send to landfill can be reused or recycled.

Even for things like glass and aluminium which can be endlessly recycled, only half ever gets recycled.

We still only recycle 13% of our plastic, leaving over 600,000 tonnes of plastic each year going to landfill or ending up in the environment.

Australia is one of the most wasteful countries in the developed world, and our waste

is increasing at twice the rate of population growth.

Better recycling is important, but it is not the real answer to reducing waste.

The problem is just too much stuff being produced and consumed, and too many things deliberately designed to be used once, then discarded.

We have become a throw-away society with cheap furniture, clothes, everything.

Too much focus is being put on us as consumers to dispose of things better. More focus must be put on industry to produce less disposable stuff, with products designed to last longer and that can be more easily recycled. They, not us, should also be required to take responsibility for their rubbish by collecting it.

Which government will have the courage to seriously require this?

We can still play our part.

- Be careful consumers buying things that will last and can be reused.
- Reduce our use of plastic.
- Shop from places that have good environmental practices. Congratulate them. Ask other stores to improve.
- Be creative with food so none is wasted.
 Learn repair and monding skills.
- Learn repair and mending skills.
- Advocate to our politicians for better legislation and support of industry best practice.
